HIGHWOOD ALLOTTED \$49,900 WPA FUNDS

Money To Be Used in Various Projects Designed for Civic Improvement

Herman Fromelt, commissioner of public works of Highwood, has announced that \$49,900 in WPA funds had been granted by the federal government for work projects in Highwood. Of this amount, \$7,585 is allotted for materials, while the remainder is to cover labor. All the work provided for in this grant must be completed in one year.

Highwood will build a garbage incinerator with a part of the grant. It will be located in Highland Park on property owned by the city of Highwood located on Prairie Avenue, just west of the Highwood city limits. Other work will include a new garage and shop and city hall improvements, such as repainting, new floors, new heating plant and other heating equipment.

Work will begin at once on widening Highwood Avenue and the intersection of Highway and Railway avenues. Additional street repairs include 1000 yards of concrete paving, one and one-half miles of resurfacing, and grading of all parkways including top soil wherever necessary.

Sever repairs are also listed under the grant. More than 22 new sewer manholes will be built through the city and 800 feet of 12-inch sewer laid. Commissioner Fromelt stated that bids on the various projects would be advertised in the near future and that more than 100 men would be employed to work on these projects.
