\$22.96 Per Capita of Insurance Money for Highland Park

Residents of Highland Park received life insurance payments in 1934 amounting to \$22.96 per capita, according to an estimate made by the Lincoln National Life Insurance Company, Fort Wayne, Ind.

Total payments to policy holders and beneficiaries of Highland Park were \$276,000, as reported in the life payments number of the National Underwriter, Arthur F. Hall, president of the Lincoln National, said. This amount included death claims and accidental death benefits paid to beneficiaries, and matured endowments, annuities, disability claims, and cash paid directly to living policy owners in this city.

Life insurance companies put \$3,101,525,930 into circulation in the United States and Canada in 1934, or more than 8 million dollars a day. Payments for this state in 1934 were \$213,000,000.

Adolf Goelitz Died Saturday, July 27

Adolf Goelitz, founder of the Goelitz Candy Company, and for many years a resident of Ravinia, died at his home in Bannockburn Saturday, July 27, at 7 p.m. of a heart attack. At the time of his death, Mr. Goelitz was 65 years old and had lived for the past ten years in Bannockburn.

He is survived by his wife Anna, four daughters, Mrs. Olivia McGann of Berkeley, Calif., Mrs. Ann Russell of the Philippine Islands; Mrs. Mildred Musselman of New York; Charlotte; and two sons, Walter of Deerfield, and Arthur of Douglaston, Long Island.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, July 30, at the Highland Park Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Louis W. Sherwin conducting the services. Interment was in Ridgeland Cemetery.

The members of the Missionary Society of the First United Evangelical Church will hold their monthly meeting on the lake front on Thursday, Aug. 8, at 3:30 p.m. At 6:30 o'clock the usual pot luck supper will be served to which other members of the families are asked to attend.

Closed Banks 50% Liquidated Dec. 31

Washington, D. C.—More than half the deposits in six thousand banks in receivership in the United States remained unpaid on December 31, 1934, it is disclosed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation as the result of a recently completed survey of bank liquidations.

Total deposits tied up with the failure of 6,352 banks for which figures were available were more than 4.7 billion dollars, of which fifty-one per cent was still not realized to depositors at the year-end. Almost all the banks had been closed for at least a year, many of them for much longer periods, the report revealed.

Included in the figures are nine closed insured banks, all of which suspended during the last six months of 1934. Records of the F. D. I. C. show that practically every depositor of these banks had received full payment of his claim by December 31.

The survey of receivership was made with the co-operation of the state banking commissioners throughout the country and the office of the Comptroller of the Currency. Briefly summarized, it was as follows: Banks in receivership on Dec. 31, 1934, 6,352 (1,551 National, 4,801 State); aggregate deposits at date of closing, \$4,739 million (\$1,882 million National, \$2,857 million State); amount of deposits unpaid on Dec. 31, 1934, \$2,396 million (\$874 million National, \$1,522 million State.)

Sunday, Sept. 1, the final service will be held in St. Paul's Evangelical Church with Dr. W. F. Weir of the Deerfield Presbyterian Church in the pulpit.

Highland Park Has Low Electric Rate

Residential users of electricity in Highland Park pay the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois a rate that is considerably lower than that charged by other Illinois companies serving towns of similar size according to a report just released by the electric rate survey division of the Federal Power Commission.

In the population grouping of 10,000 to 25,000, in which Highland Park is included, the government report lists 34 Illinois cities. For a consumption of 25 kilowatt hours per month, Public Service Company bills are ranked third lowest in the state. For 100 kilowatt hours, local rates are fourth lowest and for 250 kilowatt hour customers, local rates are the second lowest.

The government report shows a rather wide range of rates in this state. The range of bills for 25 kilowatt hours is from \$1.50 to \$2.18 with Highland Park at 1.70, for 100 kilowatt hours from \$3.51 to \$5.60, Public Service Company being \$4.68, and for 250 kilowatt hours, the range is from \$6.81 to \$10.63, local users paying \$7.68. Commenting on these differentials, the Federal Power Commission release states "Availability of fuel resources and accessibility of water power go far, in some instances, to explain differences in rate levels. Geographic and economic conditions have a marked influence, as do the varying tax policies of the several states and communities. Density of population, season requirements, presence or absence of larger industries, variations in purchasing power of the people, and even climatic conditions may give rise to rate differences not otherwise explainable. Over such variables the utility companies may have little or no control."

The report further designates whether the electrical energy to a city is supplied by an independent company, controlled by a holding company or by a municipal plant. Only six companies in the Illinois report were shown as being inde-

pendently operated and Public Service Company is one of that number. Claims of municipal ownership advocates that city ownership and operation of electricity supply means lower rates are definitely upheld by the report which shows that the only municipal plant city in the 10,000 to 25,000 population class does not have lower rates than Public Service Company.

An earlier report issued by the Federal Power Commission which presented rates for all the larger cities throughout the country shows that the rates applying in Highland Park are even lower than those charged in some of the largest cities of the United States. For instance local residential users pay less than customers of the same type in New York City, St. Paul, Toledo, Salt

Lake City, New Orleans and other cities.

Playground Children To See Cubs Game

On Wednesday, Aug. 7, children from Highland Park playgrounds are to be guests of the management of Wrigley Field, the home of the Cubs' baseball team. Any child of Highland Park wishing to go to the game should report to the caretakers at the playgrounds at once, for there is only a limited number of passes available. All children must pay their own transportation and those over 12 must pay the sales tax. Further information may be had from playground instructors.
