sociation, H. W. Lundy, secretary, dated July 25.

The handbill attacked the constitutionality of the legislative act and admonished the political parties and state and federal administrations for unbalanced budgets and increased expenditures.

"Our Democratic governor in Illinois suffered to become law the current funding statute which provides the radical change to oblige voters to petition for a referendum which heretofore was provided without any such impossible petition," the handbill says.

The handbill asks for an opinion from Attorney General Otto Kerner on the constitutionality of the legislative act.

A statement from State's Attorney Charles E. Mason, read at the meeting of the board of supervisors yesterday, said that the legislative act was in proper form or the attorney general would not have permitted to have it become effective. He also stated that some of the statistics given in the handbill on county taxes did not jibe with the records of County Treasurer Allen J. Nelson.

Records in the treasurer's office show that from the first year general taxes were collected and recorded by the county up through the collection period of 1934 there were forfeited, by property owners \$2,269,332.06 in taxes. Interest and penalties on these delinquent taxes have grown to \$832,641.12.

During 1924 approximately 80 per cent of the tax extension of \$4,866,454.06 were collected. Taxes forfeited by property owners last year totalled \$734,706.65, and there is being held up an amount of taxes pending final settlement of court litigation.

Tax experts have estimated that the interest payments and provisions for the retirement of the funding bonds would cost the taxpayers of the county less than if the present system of trading on extended credit were continued. The 4 per cent funding bonds will call for a one cent levy on each \$100 valuation. The resolution for the issuance of the bond sets up the required amounts levied from 1935 to 1953 for the interest payment and the retirement of the bonds.
