Last week it was announced that the Deerfield Post Office would be moved from its present location in the Zeiss Building on Deerfield Avenue, on Sept. 20, to Waukegan Road (U. S. No. 41) in the Moeller Building.

Petitions have been placed in four local stores, (Houts, Knaaks, Nelsons and Wilson & Reagans) to be signed by those who wish to have the Post Office remain in its present location. These petitions will be sent to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General in Washington, D. C.

The Chamber of Commerce has publicly voiced its sentiment against the removal of the Post Office from the center of the business district, and many others are now protesting. Whether these protests will do any good remains to be seen.
