"Let our readers (particularly our younger ones) take heart and look forward to the rapidly approaching time when croquet shall take the place of quadrille, when the freedom of forest picnics shall supersede parlor conventionalities, and when the leafy balcony or the moonlit lakeside shall impart an inspiration whose happy results will be traceable to these as their source; when the "Highland Park News" shall have grown to a flourishing and influential Daily, and our now tiny city achieved that proud position which bountiful nature has promised, and earnest effort striven for."

The old "News" set an ideal when it wrote: "Let us all strive to live so that the local paper may say of us as of Philip Burns, of Delaware: 'His hat wasn't always cocked over the left ear, but he didn't owe a butcher in town'."

This item on flower fashions was taken from the third edition of the "News," the first paper published in Highland Park:

"The sole fashion which should never change is the fashion set by good taste. A fashion that it not

so set is the fashion of using artificial flowers where natural ones can be substituted.  
"On hats, or bonnets the former are, of course, indispensable; but they should never be worn in any other way upon the person, or employed in the decoration of rooms."

### ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, ILLINOIS:

Section 1. That the maximum gross weight to be permitted on the road surface through any axle or axle assembly shall not exceed 16,000 pounds, nor shall it exceed 800 pounds per inch of width of the gross weight including the weight of the vehicle and maximum load of any self-propelled four-wheel vehicle shall not exceed 24,000 pounds. The gross weight, including the weight of the vehicle and the maximum load of any self-propelled six

or more wheel vehicle, including the weight of the vehicle and maximum load or the gross weight of any self-propelled vehicle operated as a tractor with one semi-trailer, including the weight of said vehicle and semi-trailer, with their maximum loads, shall not exceed 42,000 pounds, nor shall any two axles lie in the same vehicle plane, nor shall the axle spacing be less than 40 inches from center to center; provided, that the axle arrangement shall be such that the proportion of the gross load carried on any axle shall remain constant; and the gross weight, including the weight of the vehicle and maximum load of any trailer or semi-trailer, pulled or towed by motor vehicle, shall not exceed 22,000 pounds.

Section 2. That upon application the Village Marshal may grant a permit on writing for the operation of vehicles or combinations of vehicles and trailers or semi-trailers exceeding the foregoing weights. Such permits may be granted in the discretion of the Village Marshal when, in his opinion, an emergency exists warranting the granting of the permit. The permit shall be granted only for limited periods and for trips over designated highways and streets at specific times and subject to such other conditions as the Village Marshal may prescribe, but in no such case shall such permits exceed a period of ten days.

Section 3. That the maximum width of any vehicle and its load shall not exceed 10 feet 6 inches, exclusive of loose hay, straw, corn fodder, or other similar farm products, agricultural implements, threshing machines, and live trees.

Section 4. (Penalty) That any person who violates any of the provisions or sections of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine in an amount of not less than Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars and not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each such violation of said ordinance or any of the provisions thereof shall be considered as a separate and distinct violation, punishable separately and distinctly as such.

That if any section, clause, sentence or provision of this ordinance, expressly herein set forth shall be invalid and/or shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment or invalidity of such section, clause, sentence or provision, if any, shall not affect, impair, invalidate or nullify the remaining sections, clauses, sentences or provisions thereof which shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall go into effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication in accordance with the law.
