Changes in Illinois Laws of Taxation

Numerous changes were made by the last legislature in reference to the law relative to taxation. Below is a short synopsis: Whenever the refunding of securities and the extending of time of payment of any special assessments include assessments past due, and such assessments have been returned delinquent, withdrawn or forfeited, the court shall order the county collector to withdraw said assessments from the delinquent list and order the proper officers to release all property forfeited.

three years, if the sale occurs prior to July 1, 1939, and within one year if sale occurs after July 1, 1939.

Provides that drainage commissioner may be appointed receiver on account of delinquent taxes and special assessments of drainage and levee districts.

Cities which have a population of between fifty and two hundred thousand may increase their police pension fund tax from three-twentieths of one mill to not more than one-half of a mill on the dollar.

Changes the date when the county clerks shall deliver books to the collector, from December 1 to December 31, or as soon thereafter as such collectors shall qualify.

Publication of delinquent tax notice shall be in the township or road district newspaper published in the county. If no newspaper is published in the township where the property is located, then such list shall be published in the nearest newspaper to such township.

Extends the date of adjournment of Boards of Review as follows: In counties of 50,000 and 75,000, October 7; in counties between 75,000 and 100,000, November 7. Counties of less than 50,000 are not affected.

Accidents Must Be Reported Immediately

Formal reports to the State Department of Public Works & Buildings at Springfield must be made, within 24 hours, in case of an accident resulting in injury or death of a person, according to the new Illinois Traffic Code, recently passed by the Legislature and now a law in this state, says Carl A. Barrett, president of the Illinois Automobile Club.

Such reports are not necessary following an accident in which property damage only resulted, says Mr. Barrett. Official report blanks will be issued through the police, coroners, sheriffs and other agencies.

When a driver is physically unable to make the required report, if there is another person in the vehicle at the time of the accident capable of making a report, that person must do so. Witnesses of accidents may also be required to submit reports.

In case of a collision with an unattended (parked) vehicle, the driver of the colliding car must stop and either (1) find the owner or operator of the parked car and give him the name and address of the owner and driver of the colliding car, or (2) leave in the parked car, in writing, the name and address of the owner and driver of the colliding vehicle and a statement of the circumstances of the collision.

In case of an accident resulting in damages to "fixtures" upon or adjacent to the highway—stationary objects, such as traffic signs, lamp posts, etc.—the driver must locate and notify the owner of such damaged property (usually the police will be sufficient) giving his name, address and car registration number. Any city, village or incorporated town may, by ordinance, require similar reports to be made to it.

continued from page 3 Let us turn back the pages of the "Highland Park Press" to the "Highland Park News," as it was called in 1874, and see what was then thought of the trains into the city which Highland Parkers now catch so regularly.

June 1874 "A suburban train is quite a different thing from a through one. Though the aggregate of time spent on it is large it is by no means wasted. Many an acquaintance is made, many a friendship cemented, many a transaction concluded through the companionships of the road.

"But there is a difference between trains. For instance, the 6:40 a.m. is rather an aggravating train, because early risers are not in the mood for talking about important things.

"The passengers on the next train are older. Their peculiarity is that no one of them ever knows anything about anything, but his wife and babies.

"Then comes the swift Kenosha. This," says the News, "is the best of trains" ... because everyone is chattering and in good spirits.
