Government Adds Thousands of Workers

WASHINGTON — (IPS) — The Service Commission's monthly mel table for June showed that 154,000 civilian employees had been added to the Government's payroll since the advent of the new Administration. The total payroll is now \$109,300,000, including government employees as of 30 of 717,712.

Washington 36,000 employees were added in the 29 months, ending the total to 103,463. The peak of civilian government employees in Washington was 17,000 and over 900,000 for the country.
