

### LAKE FOREST SCHOOL MAY OPEN ON SEPT. 9

#### Delays in Construction and Installation May Cause Later Opening

The new \$500,000 Lake Forest high school is rapidly nearing completion, and the Deerfield-Shields board of education plans tentatively to open the school year in Lake Forest on Sept. 9, although it is possible that a later date will be set if delays are met in the installation of equipment and fulfilling of the hand-mapping contract.

Built in an L-shape, the new building faces west on McKinley road, with the wing running east from the north end of the building. Plans have been prepared for a second wing from the south end to house the auditorium and additional classrooms. Of Georgian design, the building is often mistaken for one of the costly mansions for which Lake Forest is famed.

More than 20 classrooms, laboratories for chemistry, physics and domestic science, industrial and general, all of the most modern construction, have been provided for students in the main building. The newest type of office and laboratory equipment will be installed.

The library is one of the show rooms of the school. Paneled in butternut with a large fireplace at one end it radiates an air of quiet comfort. When school opens this fall 1,000 books will be available, with more to be added as necessity demands.

The auditorium-gymnasium is located in the wing of the building. The floor from wall to wall measures 99 feet. A stage is on one end and a balcony along one side. When in use as an auditorium it has a seating capacity of about 1500, with 1000 on the main floor and about 500 in the balcony. For use during the basketball season, the gym will seat about 800, using the balcony and temporary bleachers on the floor. A rehearsal room and dressing rooms are provided for dramatic classes on the floor below the stage. Dressing rooms for gym classes, varsity teams, visiting teams, a rubbing room, and modern shower baths are also located on the floor below the gymnasium.

The natatorium is one of the most modern spots of the building. A balcony, with a seating capacity of about 200, ranges along one side of the room. The pool itself, 75 by 25 feet, fulfills the requirements for championship swimming, since the length is in multiples of 15 feet and the width in multiples of five feet. Space has been provided for a cafeteria and a band room, but they will not be finished this year. Several of the classrooms will also be left unfinished. Most of the lockers already have been installed, but equipment in the laboratories has yet to be received.

Raymond Moore, Waukegan township high school and Lake Forest college graduate, who has had 15 years experience in private secondary school work, has been named principal. A staff of 21 teachers, the majority of whom have been teaching at Deerfield-Shields, will be on the faculty. A certain number of special teachers will have classes at both schools. By doing this Lake Forest students will have the opportunity of receiving courses not usually given in schools of its size.

With the building of a modern high school in Lake Forest, Superintendent R. L. Sandwick's efforts of more than 30 years are bearing fruit. Recognized as one of the outstanding figures in secondary education, Superintendent Sandwick has labored unceasingly to give both Deerfield and Shields townships good high schools.

The Deerfield-Shields board of education is hopeful that it will be able to make the new school a center of community activity in Lake Forest. Although no definite action has been taken along these lines yet, plans are being formulated to offer the use of the buildings to Lake Forest residents at a minimum cost.

#### Highland Park Is Sixth in July Building Data

With July building totaling \$32,349 for July 1935, as compared with \$24,616 for July 1934, Highland Park was sixth in building last month among other North Shore towns, according to figures released this week by Straus Securities corporation.

Lake Forest, with \$159,272 was first, Glencoe coming in a poor second with \$82,650.

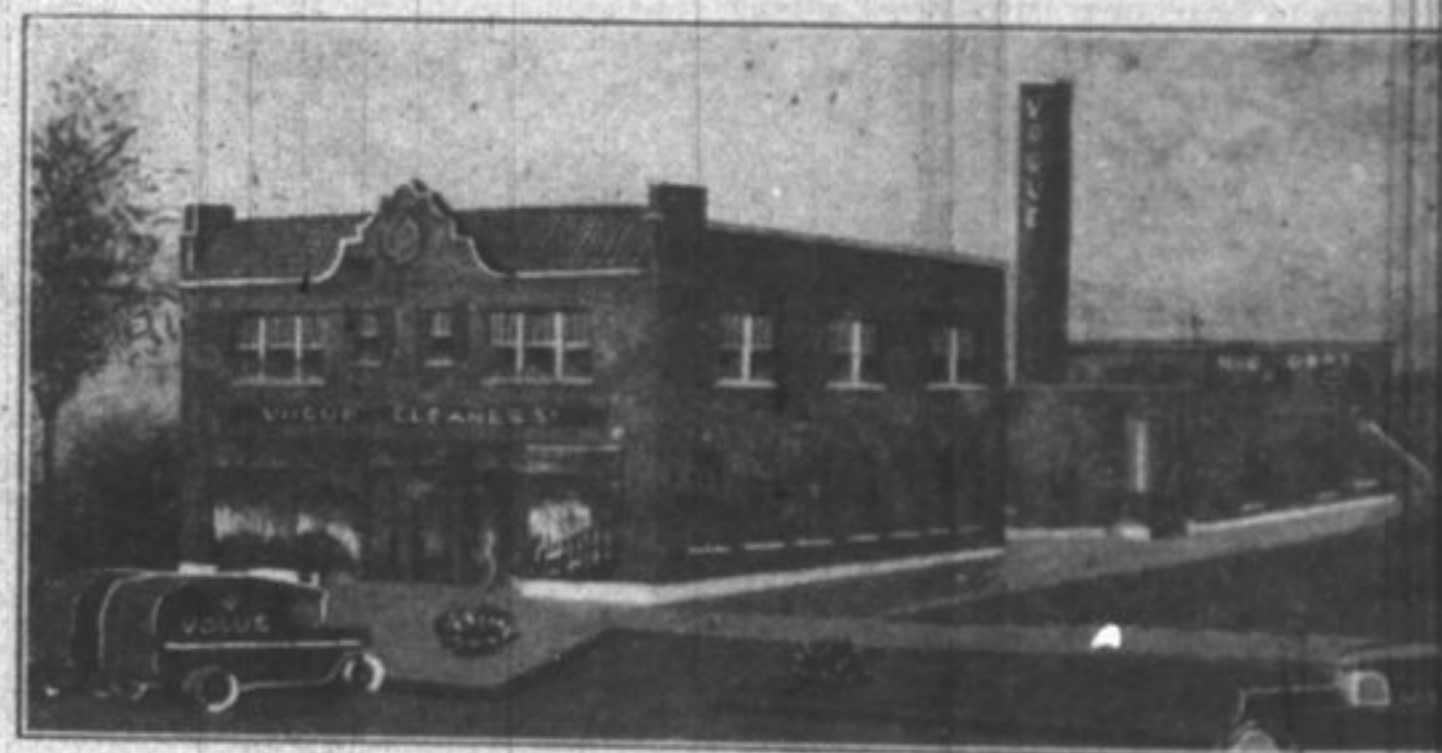
