Under The Statehouse Dome

Mining Board Examinations
An examination of State Mine Inspectors, mine managers, (first and second class), mine examiners and hoisting engineers, both steam and electric, will be held at the office of the Department of Mines and Minerals in the State House, beginning Sept. 10.

Registrations will be between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on Sept. 9. It is expected that large classes in all branches will take the examination.

The Reaction Test
One of the exhibits at the State Fair last week which attracted as much, if not more attention than any other exhibit, was the Reaction Test under the direction of the State Medical and Highway department.

The object of the test was for the purpose of determining the exact time it takes a driver of an automobile to stop his car when suddenly confronted with a hazard.

The machine, equipped with a foot accelerator, a brake pedal, a system of traffic lights, a miniature automobile and a complicated mechanism measured in fractions of seconds the time required for putting on the brakes after the flash of a signal light. This reaction time gives a person some knowledge of how fast he should drive. The fellow who requires three quarters of a second to send a message from his brain to his leg and foot muscles ought never to drive at upper speed bracket rates. At split-second delay in reaction time at high speed invites disaster. It was shown that men responded to the reaction tests more quickly than women.

Five per cent of the men and ten per cent of the women responded in three-eighths of a second. In another test given during the morning of the first day of the fair, fifty-five per cent of the men and fifty-eight per cent of the women responded in one-half of a second, while in the afternoon sixty-two per cent of the men and fifty-eight per cent of the women responded in one-half a second, indicating that the women showed more fatigue in the afternoon than they did in the morning.

One-half second is the time required to respond to the test. It is estimated that a car going at a speed of sixty miles per hour will travel 146 feet before a driver can get complete control of his brakes.

May Make Test Case
It is rumored around the Department of Fish and Game that a syndicate of sportsmen are now planning to make a test case of the constitutionality of a recent ruling by the United States Secretary of Agriculture relative to migratory fowls.

It is claimed that a treaty exists between the United States and Canada which requires that the laws of both countries in relation to migratory birds shall be in accord, and also that Congress cannot delegate its powers to a department. The case will be watched with much interest on the part of the sportsmen of the country.

It is pointed out that Canada has made no changes in her law while on the other hand the United States Secretary of Agriculture has made several rulings which expert attorneys claim will prove unconstitutional.

Road Building This Year
The road building program for Illinois this year is being delayed due to the fact that so far the federal allotment for Illinois has not yet been approved in its entirety.

The program for this year calls for a large amount of grade-crossing elimination which is very much needed in this state on account of the numerous automobile accidents. This project has the approval of the government.

Very few concrete roads will be built this year but an extensive secondary road program will be carried out. These secondary roads will be of great benefit to the farmers of this state as they will lift them out of the mud and enable them to market their crops at any season of the year.

Illinois is fast assuming the leadership of the United States in the number of miles of concrete roads. It has been up in the front ranks in road marking for some time. This is being improved each year, and the time will come when the motto will be "anyone who is able to read can go any place in Illinois with safety."

The Relief Situation
Nearly 10,000 Illinois families comprising approximately 40,000 individuals became sufficiently self-supporting during the month of June to be taken off the public relief rolls, we are informed by the Illinois Relief Headquarters in the State House.

County reports show that a total of 283,549 families received relief during the month of June as compared with 293,101 families during the previous month—a decrease of 9,552 or 3.2 per cent. The June figures show a decrease of more than 32,000 from the high figure for this year of 299,000 in March.

Increased seasonal employment, particularly in the rural areas, was

largely responsible for the June decline. This is attributed to the fact that no new relief cases were reported during the month of May.

The downstate counties where all of the June decline was recorded, showed 136,142 families receiving aid as against 146,407 in May, a drop of 10,265 or 7.2 per cent. June was the first month since December 1933 that relief rolls in the downstate counties numbered less than in Cook county.
