

WILDCATS PREPARE FOR 1935 SEASON

Evanston, Ill., Aug. 28 — Coach Lynn Waldorf, Northwestern university's new football coach, and the only new addition to ranks of Big Ten football mentors for 1935, has already assembled his new staff preparatory to the opening of practice on Sept. 10.

The new Wildcat coach has been on the scene for nearly a month. He has been joined by Burt Ingwersen, line coach, who is also a new member of the staff. Ingwersen comes to Northwestern from Louisiana State where he was associated with Coach Cliff Jones for three years. Previously he was head coach at the University of Iowa.

Other members of the Purple grid staff include Jack Vance, backfield coach and formerly head coach at Evanston high school; Waldo Fisher, end coach; Matry Kent and Bus Owens, freshman coaches. The latter three were members of last year's staff.

Coach Waldorf comes to Northwestern after nine years of successful coaching in the southwest. Upon his graduation from Syracuse university in 1925 he became head coach at Oklahoma City university, a school that had not won a game in its conference for four years. In three years time Waldorf's teams won 19 games, lost 9 and tied 3.

Following this success, he was called to the University of Kansas where he served one year as line coach. In 1929 he became head coach at Oklahoma Aggies where he remained for five years during which time his teams won two Missouri Valley championships and four state titles.

Last year, when Coach Bo McMillin left Kansas State to become coach at Indiana, Waldorf was selected as his successor. The team won all of its five conference games, clinching the season with a 19 to 7 victory over Nebraska in the last game of the season.

The new Wildcat staff will receive a severe test in its first season, being confronted by the heaviest schedule in the school's history. The first four conference games on the schedule include in order, Purdue, Ohio, Minnesota and Illinois. They were the first four teams in the conference standings last year. Other games include DePaul, the opening opponent; Iowa which has defeated the Purple the past two seasons; Wisconsin, which tied with Northwestern for fifth place last year, and Notre Dame, annual rival for many years.

A squad numbering 60 players will report to the new coaching staff Sept. 10. Of this number, 26 were lettermen last year. Eleven lettermen, including six regulars from the 1934 team have either graduated or dropped out of school.

Three Local Golfers Enter Herald-Ex. Golf Tournament

Three Highland Park golfers are among those who will enter the Herald and Examiner caddie tournament next week at the Jackson Park course.

In 1929 and '30 he won the class B finals, in 1932 was runner-up at match play and in 1934 and '35 won the club championship outright. As No. 2 on the caddy team, he lost only one match.

Jim McMillen Is Scheduled To Meet "Crybaby" Zaharias

Jim McMillen, Lake County's favorite son and ranking number one contender for the world's heavyweight wrestling championship, and "Crybaby" George Zaharias, most feared and hated matman in the sport, will wrestle one fall to a finish in the last all-star mat card of the season to be staged in the Round Lake Haunted House Open-Air Sports Arena, Friday night, Sept. 6.

McMillen, who is returning from a three week training period at the camp of his Chicago Bears, is in the pink of condition from playing, coaching, and wrestling with his teammates, and is all ready to fire his biggest guns in a new bid for the world's title.

Zaharias, known to the wrestling world as the "Weeping" Greek, will be making his first Lake County appearance, and is hailed along with Jimmy McMillen as one of the ten biggest drawing cards in the professional ranks as well as an outstanding contender for the world's title. The Colorado beet farmer, who recently started a riot in the ring after his Chicago match with Danno O'Mahoney, believes he was given "the works" by the referee, and is now clamoring for another chance at the Irish youth.

As McMillen is the outstanding challenger for title honors in these parts, Zaharias was told by Chicago promoters to beat McMillen before he would be given a title shot. When he issued a challenge to the Antioch sportsman, Les White, realizing the possibilities of a big gate, literally "stole" the great match from Chicago, and signed it for Lake County. This bout will mark the fourth meeting of the pair in the ten years that each has been wrestling professionally. McMillen holds the edge in their three previous meetings, with two wins to Zaharias one. Despite this fact, Zaharias is one of the most dangerous grapplers in the game, and he has the infamous reputation of being the roughest, toughest, and meanest wrestler of them all, barring none. The local mat fans who were all riled up over the unsportsmanlike conduct of Lou Plummer and Dick Raines, probably will praise these two rowdies as gentlemen after watching the "Crybaby" in action.

With the main event closed, the matchmaker is now seeking the services of Lou Plummer, Ray Richards and other favorites for the supporting bout of the program. The complete card will be announced shortly.
