Notice To High School Students
Classes for freshmen at Deerfield-Shields Township High School will begin on Monday, September 9, at 8:45 a.m. All classes will be in session on the following day.
Students should obtain text books according to the following schedule:
Friday, Sept. 6, from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.
Saturday, Sept. 7, 9 a. m. to 1 p. m.
Free street car tickets for those living beyond the 2-mile limit may also be secured at the school on these days as per schedule above. No tickets are used on the bus.
Steel lockers for books and wraps are furnished free, but each student is required to purchase a combination padlock. To new students these cost 70 cents each; other students are already provided.
Students who have moved into the district and are entering this school for the first time should observe the schedule above.
Classes have been made up during the summer, and the careful registration of last spring cannot now be changed.
The Deerfield bus will pick up students Friday and Saturday mornings leaving Bannockburn at 8:30 a.m., via Wilmot School to Deerfield, and leaving Deerfield at 9:00. The bus will return, leaving the High School at 11:00 a.m. The afternoon schedule will leave Bannockburn at 1:00; Wilmot at 1:10 and Deerfield at 1:20 p.m. The bus will leave school to return at 4:00 p.m. Friday and 1:00 p.m. Saturday.
