Lincoln school has 377 this year as compared with 383 last year; Ravinia 396 this year, 397 last; Braeside 109, last year 88, and Ridge school 45 as compared with last year's total of 41.

In June of this year registration was as follows: Lincoln, 363; Ravinia, 396; Braeside, 87, and Ridge, 38.
