Rites Held Tuesday For Alexander McVity

Alexander Perry McVity of Highwood died at the Hines Hospital in Maywood Sunday, Sept. 16. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War and had been a resident of Highwood for the past 25 years. McVity had served in the 2nd U. S. Cavalry in Cuba during the Spanish American War, receiving an honorable discharge in July, 1899, after which he came to Highwood to live.

Services were held on Tuesday morning at St. James Church in Highwood, Rev. Ward officiating.

Interment was in Mooney's Cemetery, where Henry Hansen, chaplain of the Eighth District, American Legion, conducted the last rites.

McVity is survived by nine children all of whom live in Highwood: Mrs. Charles Bailey, Mrs. William Altman; Mrs. Esther Hennessey, Robert Perry, John Perry, Edward Perry, William Perry, Genevieve Perry and Richard Perry.

SINISTER BACKGROUND

For more than a decade a proposed Child Labor amendment to the Constitution of the United States has been going the rounds of State Legislatures seeking ratification. How many citizens know that it was drafted by Mrs. Florence Kelley (Wischnewetzky) — probably the most energetic female Marxian apostle who ever spread revolutionary doctrine in the U. S. A.—Miss Julia Lathrop of Hull House and the University of Chicago; Miss Grace Abbott, now professor of the Public Welfare Administration at the University of Chicago; and Anna Louise Strong, Communist associate editor of the Moscow News?

How many of our citizens know that this group and their allies have aimed from the first to regiment the children of the nation, for State Socialism? And that they have aimed to do this by gaining, one way or another, absolute control of the physical and educational activities of all persons under the age of 18? And that the Children's Bureau of the Federal Government was operated for the furtherance of such aims? And that the Communist Anna Louise Strong was the propagandist of the Bureau under Miss Lathrop and Miss Abbott?

How many of our citizens know that Children's Bureau Bulletin No. 57 was the work of Alexandra Kollantay, who was Lenin's first Commissar of Social Welfare, taking children from their parents and training them as wards of the Soviet Government? And that skillful propaganda, paid for by the first appropriations, induced Congress to raise the ante for these women within two years, from \$29,000 to \$1,250,000?

How many of our citizens know that the Socialistic and Communistic elements are continuing this effort at nationalizing our children in this year 1935, in spite of declarations by the U. S. Supreme Court that the regulation of child labor is "a power as to a purely local matter to which the Federal authority does not extend"; and that one of the means by which they are hoping to do this is the Children's Nursery set-up under the FERA?

There are more details in this sinister background. The above, however, should be sufficient to cause any true American to scan the news of the day with searching eye, and to write forcibly to state and national representatives whenever there is any measure under consideration affecting the fundamental liberties of our citizenry or the growth of American civilization.—The Vigilante—Published by the American Vigilant Intelligence Federation. 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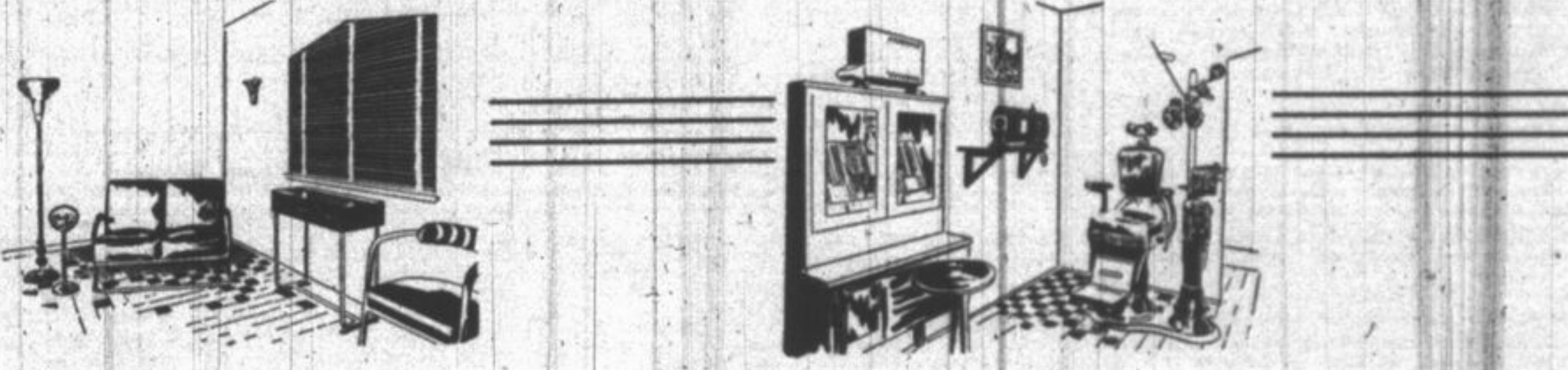
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
