This Week in Washington

Evanston, Ill., Sept. 14—A number of young men and women in the District have written me with regard to the National Youth Administration. Most of them are contemplating entering college this month if they should be able to obtain financial assistance. A few have expressed an interest in securing employment and wish to know how and to whom to apply for placement assistance. For the benefit of these worthy young people it is well to present here certain pertinent details of this program.

Under the authority of the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935 the President by executive order established the National Youth Administration on June 26, making \$50 millions available for a youth program out of the \$4 billion \$80 million appropriated. All needy young men and women between the ages of 16 and 25 years of age within the scope of the program. It was estimated by Mr. Aubrey W. Williams, who was designated to serve as executive director, that 650,000 would be aided, of which number 120,000 would be college students, 100,000 high school students and approximately 4,000 post graduates in the universities.

For those high school students whose families are on the relief rolls \$6 per month will be given. Applications for such assistance should be made with the principal of the particular high school. Likewise the college undergraduate should apply to the president of the college of his choice or his designated official for the part time work on an average basis of \$15 per month. For the most part these work relief jobs will be on the campus, such as clerical assistance in the various offices, research work, and custodial service, but the work may also be in connection with certain community activities.

The program also includes "job training and job placement." I understand from recent conversation with the National Youth Administration that this particular phase has been meeting with certain difficulties. While there is to be no displacement of those already employed, it is felt that the ultimate result will be a reduction in the wage scale of the employed heads of families, inasmuch as the services of youth are made available at a lower wage cost.

Those interested in this particular program for the state of Illinois may well communicate with Mr.

William J. Campbell, 1319 South Michigan Avenue, Chicago, who is in charge of the State Youth Division of the National Youth Administration.

In connection with the national youth movement inaugurated by President Roosevelt it should be pointed out that several leading educators have been strongly objecting to it. While it is admitted that special attention should be given to the young men and women of the nation, these educators see in the program an attempt to nationalize the youth, such as Hitler has been doing in Germany. The program has been severely criticized as an attempt to build up a sympathetic following for the Roosevelt Administration among those who have just become of voting age and who will be going to the polls within a couple of years. Critics state that on the surface it is a splendid program, as far as its publicity stated objectives are concerned, but upon analysis it will be found that it is simply a vote getting mechanism.

One of the great libraries in the world is the Library of Congress, which faces the United States Capitol and is directly across from the new United States Supreme Court building, which likewise faces the Capitol. Copies of every book published in the country are deposited with this library, which also houses the original copy of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States.

The Library of Congress maintains a highly trained and specialized staff of workers. Just last Thursday, Miss Irene A. Wright, member of the European mission of the library, deposited with Dr. Herbert Putnam, the librarian, important papers missing from the files of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and Patrick Henry. It appears that a New England writer by the name of Gerald Sparks gave away certain original Washington manuscripts entrusted to him shortly after the Revolution. After 21 years of research in Seville, Spain, Miss Wright secured the papers and it is reported that the Library of Congress now has about 98 per cent of the Washington papers.

The new Archives building, located at the corner of Constitution and Pennsylvania avenues, will house the cherished documents of the United States. It is under the supervision of Mr. E. D. W. Connor, and is claimed to be one of the finest archives establishments in the world.

Another Local Advantage

With the installation of the sprinkler systems for fire prevention in the Lake Forest, and Highland Park high schools and the high standard of fire prevention maintained in primary schools in this vicinity, local residents may well find relief in the thought that the following editorial, reproduced from a national service, does not apply to the schools attended by their children.

Some of the most tragic fires in American history have occurred in schools. Thousands of children have been cremated, and thousands more have carried the marks of disfiguring burns through life — because schoolhouses were improperly constructed, inefficiently protected, or inadequately equipped with fire escapes, staircases and fire doors.

The lessons of the past have had relatively little effect on the present. Survey after survey, conducted by responsible experts, have demonstrated that hundreds of schools are fire traps. And these schools are not all in the "little red schoolhouse" classification — some of our hand-somest and most superficially modern institutions of learning contain great and unnecessary dangers.

The National Board of Fire Un-

derwriters, representative organization of the nation's principal stock fire insurance companies, carries on an aggressive campaign in the interest of safer schools. When possible, it makes inspections of school buildings, and offers suggestions for changes and additions — often National Board experts have pointed to serious and unnecessary hazards which had been overlooked for years. And, beginning last year, it widened its field of action by issuing self-inspection blanks for schools, whereby any capable school official can systematically check the buildings and equipment involved, discover dangers and inadequacies, and make or suggest the necessary corrections. The blank, which has been adopted and officially approved by the National Association of Public School Business Officials, is to be sent this year to 1,700 secretaries and presidents of boards of education and fire chiefs in cities of 5,000 and over. Officials in smaller towns can doubtless obtain the blanks from the National Board on request.

The school building which houses your child may be a menace to his life and health. Inspect it — and make it safe. No communal activity could be more important.
