WILDCATS TO MEET DE PAUL SATURDAY

Northwestern's football team moves into its third and final week of pre-season drills with the knowledge that much polishing will remain before the squad will be ready for the opener with De Paul at Dyche stadium Saturday (Sept. 28).

Much interest attaches to the Wildcats' opener this year. It will mark the debut of Coach Lynn Waldorf and the other new members of the Purple coaching staff including Burt Ingwersen, line coach, and Jack Vance, backfield coach. All three are newcomers to the Northwestern staff.

The Wildcats are not in the way of underestimating the strength of the Blue Demons from De Paul. For the past several years they have been piling up a remarkable record of victories and would like nothing better than to score an upset over a Big Ten opponent. Coach Jim Kelley and his aides have been working feverishly of late to whip together an outfit that will be prepared to give the Purple an interesting afternoon next Saturday.

Rapid progress has been made by the Wildcats in assimilating the new system installed by Coach Waldorf. The players have been quick to pick up the details of the new shift and in recent scrimmages they have clicked off their plays in workmanlike fashion.

However, a number of positions on the team have been giving the coaching staff considerable concern. The end assignments present the greatest problem. Bill Henderson, last year's regular, has been unable to work out yet due to an ankle injury received during the summer. His place at left end is occupied at the moment by "Babe" Bender, a member of the basketball team who is playing his first season of football.

A knee injury sustained by Sam Papich, regular right tackle, has complicated the situation at that spot. With Papich on the side lines for the opener it is likely that either Vange Burnett or Les Schreiber, a pair of reserves from last year will get the call. DeWitt Gibson, 225 pounder, seems to be the choice for left tackle.

Paul Tangora and Steve Reid, a pair of experienced players, will probably start at left and right guard respectively. Both seem to have a slight edge over the other candidates. Co-captain Al Lind, playing his third year, has the center job pretty well sewed up although Leon Wegner, husky sophomore, and Leon Fuller, 200 pound letterman, are pushing him hard.

The backfield situation is hard to figure out. Bob Swisher, speedy veteran, and Don Heap, hard running sophomore, are waging a great battle for left half. Co-captain Wally Cruice, a senior, Francis Eward and Elpo Hayskar, juniors, and Bill Boger, a sophomore, are the candidates for right half with Cruice holding an edge over the lot.

Don Geyer who played fullback last year, and Steve Toth, long distance punter, are fighting it out for quarterback with the choice about

DEERFIELD PREPARES FOR LIBERTYVILLE

"Little Giants" Defeat Crystal Lake 13-0 in First Game of Season

Fresh from their 13-0 victory over Crystal Lake Saturday, the Blue and White football team of Deerfield-Shields will travel to Libertyville to play the Wildcats Friday afternoon.

Libertyville, champ of the Northwest league, has always been one of the strongest teams in Lake county. This year is no exception and if Deerfield can't stop them they are expected to go through their schedule undefeated.

With a pass attack of high calibre, the Wildcats are expected to give Deerfield some of the stiffest opposition it will run into this year. A husky line is counted upon to cut down Deerfield's line power attack.

Practice sessions this week are being used to polish the "Little Giants" up for this encounter. Particular stress is being put on a pass defense to coup with Libertyville's before mentioned powerful pass attack. Because of the warm weather that is expected on Friday the team is scrimmaging even in the hot weather with a vim and vigor that will surprise followers of previous Deerfield teams.

With reserves almost as strong as the first team, the Blue and White boys are expected to give a good account of themselves Friday. The game will start at 4 p.m.

Displaying a quality of offensive power that could not be denied, Deerfield's Blue and White football team drove their way to a decisive 13 to 0 victory over Crystal Lake last Saturday at the Athletic field.

Although it was a loosely played game due to the fumbling and uncertain blocking and tackle of most season openers it gave supporters of the team a ray of hope for better football teams at Deerfield-Shields.

After a seesaw first quarter Deerfield hit its stride late in the second quarter and on an end run Inman scored the first tally. Swan kicked the extra point. Early in the 4th quarter Holstrom took the ball over from the 12-yard line.

The chief ground gainer of the day was "Ace" Dotlavo, who showed tremendous driving power through the line. Outstanding in the line was Ball at center, Kluge and Garrity at guard, Riechman at end and Stuple and Dompke at tackle.

Deerfield will travel to Libertyville on Friday afternoon to take on the Wildcats. This promises to be a "natural" in that Libertyville has an exceptionally strong and husky team. The game starts at 4:00 p.m.

Bentonelli Concert To Benefit Children

In the presentation of Joseph Bentonelli in concert at Orchestra Hall on Monday evening, Oct. 28, is further manifestation of an altruistic dream of sixteen years ago of the members of Alpha Gamma Delta, national sorority.

At the national convention in 1919, the idea of a summer camp, sponsored and maintained by the sorority, for undernourished and underprivileged children was brought up, and action was immediately taken. A camp site was selected at Jackson, Mich., and through earning funds from the forty-eight active and fifty-four alumnae chapters and private subscription, the camp flourished.

During the years, more than 3,000 children have received the benefits offered by the two-week periods at the sorority camp. Over 700 of the university girls have served as "mothers" for these children, in view of the fact that there are no paid attendants at the camp.

So successful was the venture at

Jackson, that four years ago another camp was started at Ontario, Canada, and, although it has not, as yet, a building like that in Jackson, it is caring for its "guests" in large tents.

In the past, funds have been raised for the maintenance of the camps by donations from the various chapters. This year, the members of the Chicago Alumnae Club, in the hope of promoting more widespread interest in the activities of the sorority, are sponsoring this first large-scale benefit.
