Japanese Delegation To Visit Great Lakes

The Japanese delegation of five war veterans headed by Admiral Isamu Takeshita, retired, and including Lieutenant General Harushige Ninomiya, retired, now on a goodwill tour of the United States on the invitation of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will visit the Naval Training station at Great Lakes as the guest of Rear-Admiral John Downes, U. S. N., Commandant Ninth Naval District.

The delegation will arrive at Great Lakes about noon on Saturday, October 5, accompanied by the Honorable Sadao Iguchi, the Consul for Japan in Chicago, and representatives of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of Illinois. They will be greeted by Captain C. C. Baughman, N.S.N., executive officer of the training station, their host in the absence of Admiral Downes, whose official duties with the Naval Reserves will require his being in the Twin Cities on that day.

After buffet luncheon in the Commandant's house, the distinguished guests will be honored at 1:30 p.m. with a special review of the Recruit Battalion, at which time Admiral Takeshita will be given a salute of seventeen guns. Immediately following the review, the delegation will return to Chicago.
