High School Boy Injured In Automobile Crash

James Garrity of Highwood, star guard of the Deerfield-Shields township high school football team, suffered a broken leg Wednesday afternoon, September 25 at 3:45 when the school bus taking a load of football players to the athletic field struck a parked car in attempting to turn off of Green Bay road to West Park avenue, Highland Park.

The bus struck the rear bumper of the parked car in such a way as to force the bumper forward. When it was released it sprang back and struck Garrity, who was the first boy inside the door of the bus. The bumper struck the boy on the leg below the knee, throwing him out of the bus. He was taken to the Highland Park hospital where it was found that his leg had been broken.

C. C. Elker, one of the instructors at the high school, was driving the bus. Garrity, in addition to being a member of the football team, was one of the leading track men at Deerfield, winning the county javelin championship last year at Waukegan.

At the last general meeting of all committees, Hon. John C. Myers Jr., mayor of Highwood, was present and assured the committee of the hearty co-operation of the city council for the event, and also that he was pleased to report that General Dana T. Merrill, commanding officer of Fort Sheridan, and his staff, would participate both in the parade as well as the ceremonies and it was also anticipated that the band and a company of infantry from the post will also take part.

The committee also reported that Ren. Richard J. Lyons of Libertyville accepted the invitation to be the speaker of the day. Mr. Lyons has made a study of the life and activities of Columbus, and is there fore well qualified to make an interesting address on the subject.

Present plans for the program of the day are: parade will form at the city hall, Highwood, at 2 p.m., Oct. 13, and move out to the Oak Terrace school over the proscribed route, at which place the speaking will take place, outside on the terrace, the weather permitting, and inside the auditorium if the weather is inplement.

The opening address will be made by John Ugolini, chairman of the occasion, who will introduce the mayor of Highwood, John C. Myers. Mayor Myers will then deliver the address of welcome to the distinguished guests of the day. Mr. Lyons will then deliver the principal address of the day. Services Wednesday for Mrs. Mary E. Beaudin

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T. B. Ass'n Sponsors Health Education in Elementary Schools

One of the interesting developments of the tuberculosis work in Lake County is the health education program which is offered to all elementary schools.

In 1932 this work began as an experimental study under the direction of Miss Theda Waterman when six representative schools were selected on the basis of distribution, equipment and school finances. The course of study followed the outline of Dr. C. E. Turner, head of the department of health education at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The work was enlarged under the direction of Miss Mary Kendall, the present executive secretary, to include thirteen schools. A course of study on a selected health subject, with additional reading references, playlets, songs, suggestions for posters, booklets, etc., is sent to the teachers the first of each month. Movies and talks on health subjects are presented at the parent-teacher meetings.

The children are weighed every month and a school record is kept so gains can be noted. Measurements are taken twice a year. There is a short daily health inspection of nails, teeth, hair, clothing. Much stress is laid on having a neat appearance. It is urged that every school serve a hot lunch during the winter months.

Through the courtesy of the Lake County Dental Association examinations were given to 516 children last year. Slips recommending the dental care were sent home to the parents.

The purpose of the course as outlined in the first monthly assignment is to establish "health consciousness" in the children, to help them become healthier, happier citizens, to establish health rules so firmly that they will be carried out unconsciously, to teach rules of good citizenship, to help build up resistance against disease, to make every effort possible to secure correction of defects and to prevent any new defects from occurring as far as possible.

This course of study is available to any elementary school in Lake County for the asking. Teachers desiring such a service should get in touch with the Tuberculosis Association. This program and other phases of the tuberculosis work are made possible by the sale of Christmas Seals at Thanksgiving time.
