The North Shore Yacht Club has stated that a chart of soundings has been completed and is made available for designs and estimates. Several plans have already been drawn up, and more are expected in preparation for the Army engineers' hearing.

The soundings were completed after a great deal of difficulty caused by high winds and rough seas. The operation was directed by a committee of surveyers and engineers including E. L. Weeks, P. E. Cole, and S. D. Morris.
