## HARBOR PLANS TO BE SUBMITTED SOON

### Yacht Club Completes Chart of Soundings for Proposed Harbor

A new impetus has been added to the campaign for a harbor in Highland Park by an announcement that the project will be formally proposed to federal engineers at an early date. The North Shore Yacht Club has stated that a chart of soundings has been completed and is made available for designs and estimates. Several plans have already been drawn up, and more are expected in preparation for the Army engineers' hearing.

The soundings were completed after a great deal of difficulty caused by high winds and rough seas. The operation was directed by a committee of surveyors and engineers including E. L. Weeks, P. E. Cole, and S. D. Morris.

Last Saturday, during further attempts, a slight accident occurred. A motor-boat, with Joe Riddle and John Seyfarth as crews, experienced motor trouble. Efforts to row against a strong west wind caused a broken oarlock, but by good seamanship the crew were able to catch the outer buoy of the racing course and prevent themselves from drifting out into the lake. An SOS, sent by semaphore flag, brought Robert Carter in "Flutterby," the only available boat at the time. Slow progress was made in towing the motor-boat against the wind, but within half an hour a hastily organized crew manned the life-saving dory and picked up both boats.

In order to crystallize the public opinions and provide strength to the harbor campaign, the North Shore Yacht Club has called a special, open meeting to discuss and lay further plans. The meeting will be held in the council chamber of the Highland Park city hall, and will be Wednesday, Oct. 9, at 7:30 p.m. All people, whether yachtsmen or not, who live along the North Shore and are interested in this harbor campaign, are invited to attend. The yacht club also makes the an-

ouncement that the next regular meeting, Thursday, Oct. 3, will be the annual meeting. At this time there will be the annual election of officers, and complete reports will be heard from the treasurer and various committees on the year's activities, membership gain, and the plans for the winter.

## N. U. WILL PLAY PURDUE AT NIGHT

### Time of Game Is Changed Because of World Series

Evansville, Ill.—Precedent will go by the boards here Saturday night when Northwestern and Purdue meet in the first night game ever played between two Big Ten teams. The contest, which is the first conference engagement of the 1935 season was originally scheduled for the afternoon but the fact that many Northwestern season ticket holders desired to attend the World Series caused the athletic authorities to switch to the evening. The kick off will be at 8 o'clock.

Illumination will be provided by the huge batteries of lights that turned night into day at Soldier Field for the All-Star-Bear football game last month. Workmen are already busy transferring the lights and they will be installed by Thursday night. Both teams will practice under the flood lights Friday night. The coaches of the rival teams have had experience playing night football. Coach Nobel Kizer of Northwestern was head coach of the All-Star college eleven that played the Chicago Bears a year ago while Coach Lynn Waldorf played a large portion of his games at night during his coaching career in the Missouri Valley.

The game itself is expected to provide thrills aplenty. Purdue, untested by the usual early season warm up game, will engage a Northwestern eleven that had its hands full in turning back a stubborn De Paul team last Saturday. Northwestern's showing against De Paul was not one to cause any elation in the Wildcat camp but at the same time it provided an ideal type of opening game. There is no danger of the Purdue becoming overconfident as Coach Waldorf keeps them busy correcting the numerous flaws that cropped up against the Blue Demons.
