### FHA Business Reaches Peak in September

Another week in which all previous records for amount of business handled under mutual mortgage insurance provisions of the national housing act were broken is reported for the week ending September 24 by the northern Illinois district office of the Federal Housing Administration of Chicago.

The total loan value of mortgages in three stages of process in the district office for the week is \$573,900. These include mortgages accepted for appraisal, those accepted for insurance and premium-paying recorded mortgages.

Mortgages accepted for appraisal, with fees paid, numbered 23 totaling \$115,750, of which 19 for \$93,580 were for refinancing on existing property, and 4 in amount of \$21,900 were for new home construction. Mortgages accepted for insurance totaled 28 amounting to \$141,500. Of these, 21 for \$105,200 were for refinancing, and 7 for \$36,300 covered new construction. The construction cost value of the 11 new construction projects in the foregoing classifications is \$64,415.

During the same week a total of 64 new mortgages were accepted for appraisal with a loan value of \$316,

### 650. Refinancing accounted for 58 of these in amount of \$278,850, while the remaining 6 for \$38,300 were for new construction.

Thus the total to date of mortgages accepted for insurance in the northern Illinois district is 254 in amount of \$1,229,450, and of mortgages recorded and on which banks have made the loans 275 for \$1,279,435.
