

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCT. 6-12

The following warning about fire and caution to be observed to prevent a fire, and what to do should a fire occur, is issued by Edward C. Hoskins, fire marshal of Highland Park.

"If your house would burn tonight, would you be able to get your family out safely? Many of the thousands who lose their lives in fires annually would be spared if a little time were spent in planning what to do in a fire emergency, and if they were warned not to open doors without first touching them to find out if they were already hot.

"Now is the time to have oil burners inspected. Even though the oil burner is automatic there is no piece of apparatus that does not require attention and especially after a summer of idleness. Call a furnace man to inspect your coal heating plant. The smoke pipes will rust out especially if the basement is damp. Rust holes in smoke pipes have caused many fires. Oily rags should be burned. When rags are allowed to lay, there is danger of spontaneous combustion which may cause serious loss. To clean materials in the home is dangerous. Pilot lights on gas stoves and water heaters have caused explosions and fires and in several cases serious injuries to the person doing the cleaning.

"Plan in advance what to do if fire should occur in the home. Then no time will be lost by indecision or lack of knowledge. Particularly is this true of fires that occur in the night.

"In reporting a fire, care must be taken to give the proper information as to location: such as the number of the house, the street and near what cross street. This information gives the firemen a quick location and will guard against a mistake in interpreting the name of the street. Many of the names of streets sound similar especially when given by an excited person over the telephone. Six thousand of the ten thousand deaths by fire each year occur in homes and a large percentage of these are women and children.

"You must practice fire prevention if you want to protect your home and your loved ones." "Fire Week" has been officially designated as from October 6 to 12, inclusive.

Mr. Holden was the designer of many electrical devices, including an overhead trolley used on buses. Mr. Holden is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bertha Graham Holden, two daughters, Joan and Suzanne, and two sons, Richard and Jack.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence. Interment was in Grace-Land Cemetery.

Amelia Riehr Peisert, 70, Died Saturday, Oct. 5

Last rites for Mrs. Adolph Peisert, 70, of 1722 Broadway avenue, were held Tuesday in Chicago with the Rev. H. F. Siemsen of the Bethany church officiating. Interment was in Mount Rose cemetery.

Amelia Riehr Peisert was born at Sagan, Germany on November 11, 1865, and died on Saturday, October 5, 1935.

At the age of 36 Mrs. Peisert, her husband and their family came to America to make their future home. They located near North avenue and Halsted street in Chicago. A little later they moved to the Humboldt Park area, where they lived till the death of Mr. Peisert which took place 20 years ago. After the passing of her husband Mrs. Peisert went to the home of her daughter Mrs. Paul Beyer, where she spent the remaining days of her life.

Mrs. Peisert, as a child was confirmed in the Lutheran faith and united with the church in which she gained her early religious training. Upon coming to America she united with the Lutheran church in the vicinity of her home and has maintained her relationship to the close of her life. She also was a member of the Lake View Damen Verein lodge.

Jack Hyton Program To Be Broadcast from London October 13

Chicago—To herald his coming to the United States, Jack Hyton, Europe's most celebrated musical showman, will broadcast a one hour program, featuring his band and international revue, from St. George theatre, London, next Sunday night, Oct. 13.

The program, which will be short-waved to the Radio Corporation of America station at River Head, Long Island, will be relayed overland and then re-broadcast by nineteen Columbia stations in as many cities in the central west from 9:30 to 10:30 p.m., central standard time.

This will be the first of a series of twenty-six programs sponsored by the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. The second will be from aboard the Normandie at the same hour the following Sunday night, while ensuing programs will be from Chicago where visual broadcasts will be given.

Owing to the difference in time, the program in St. George Theatre, which will be received here next Sunday night, will be given from 9:30 to 4:30 a.m. London time, but despite the hour, one of the most distinguished audiences ever to gather in the historic playhouse will be present, it was announced. The Prince of Wales and other members of the royal family are expected to be among the guests, as well as many notables of the stage and musical world.

In addition to the famous Hyton band, the talent in his international

revue will include Eve Beck, the distinguished vocalist, who is the Countess de Canevi di Rivarolo in private life, Alec Templeton, the blind pianist and novelty musician, Pat O'Malley, an Irish crooner, Magda Neil, a colorful singer from Australia, and Peggy Dell, an Irish girl with a deep voice, who specializes in rhythm numbers. These artists, also will come to the United States.

The local Columbia station which will carry the series of broadcasts is WBBM, Chicago.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE USE AND CONSUMPTION OF WATER FURNISHED BY THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, ILLINOIS, that the following rules and regulations for the government of water works and users in the Village of Deerfield, Illinois, be and they are hereby adopted and established:

(a) No taker or user of water who has at any time heretofore been, or in the future becomes, in default on payment of water taken from the Village of Deerfield shall be granted or renewed rendered water service unless a cash deposit shall be made by the applicant or water taker and thereafter maintained at all times for the security and prompt payment of all water used and until the date of such water is discontinued; the deposit as herein required shall be as follows:

For a dwelling of six rooms or less, a deposit of three dollars shall be made. For a dwelling of not less than six rooms and not more than eight rooms, a deposit of five dollars shall be made. For a dwelling of over eight rooms, a deposit of ten dollars shall be made. For a newly market, restaurant or laundry, a deposit of twenty-five dollars shall be made.

And for all other takers or users of water, a deposit shall be made in an amount determined by the Board of Trustees based upon their experience and discretion, but in no event shall said deposit be in an amount less than the estimated largest monthly bill for water service to be rendered.

Provided, that any such deposit may be applied in payment of or in account of any water bills in default at any time at the election or discretion of the Village Collector, and provided further that if the amount of any such deposit shall be lessened by reason of the application of said deposit of any part thereof, in payment or reduction of any water bill, then unless said deposit of the respective full amounts required by this ordinance shall be replaced within five days the water service to any such premises shall be terminated and the meter removed.

Provided further, that the deposits herein contemplated shall be kept in a separate fund and not intermingled with any other funds of the Village and shall be returned to such depositor at such time as all water service furnished to said taker or user taker or user indicates in writing that it is desired that such service be terminated. No interest shall be paid on such deposit except only where the Village or collector collects interest upon the same. In the event of neglect or refusal to pay for water consumed by such taker or user at such buildings, structures or premises for which such deposit was placed, the Village may at its discretion use such deposit in application in satisfaction of the obligation of such user or taker remitting the surplus, if any, to such user or taker upon termination of such water service.

(b) That where, in the discretion of the Board of Trustees, it will be to the best interest of the Village to have meters read often than once each month the Board of Trustees shall so designate and the authorized officers or employees of the Village shall have free access and entry to every part of any building, structure or premises whenever such access or entry is deemed necessary or advisable, at all reasonable time, in relation to the water service of the Village of Deerfield. In case any person in possession, charge or control of any such building, structure or premises into which such officer or employee shall desire entrance or access shall refuse to permit such entry or access or shall do so or cause to be done any act or thing for the purpose of preventing such entry or access, the Village may turn off the service from such building, structure or premises at once and until notice shall have been given to the Village in writing that an entry or
