GIRL SCOUTS TO ENTER RED CROSS HOME

A splendid opportunity is offered
to Girl Scouts, as well as all other
Highland Park girls, by the course
in Home Hygiene and Care of the
Sick sponsored by the Red Cross at
the Y.W.C.A. enrollment and explana-
tion of the 12 week course will be
given at 4 o'clock on Thursday, Oc-
tober 10. Regular meetings of the
course, which is for 7th grade, 8th
grade and high school girls, will be-
gin Friday, Oct. 18, at 4 o'clock.

The Home Nurse Proficiency badge
is one of the requirements for the
rank of first class scout; so it is ex-
pected that a large number of scouts
will take advantage of this expert
instruction. To receive this badge,
a scout must demonstrate five points
in the proper care of a sick room
at home, and eight points in the
Home Care of the Sick. She must
also show her ability in five other
important aspects of sick room care,
including the preparation of a meal
suitable for a sick person.

GIRL SCOUTS ASK PARENTS HELP IN RAISING STANDARDS

A questionnaire was mailed this
week to parents of all Highland
Park Girl Scouts, in an effort to
co-ordinate the Scout program even
more closely with the other activities
of school and home. It reads as
follows:

Girl Scouting aims to give girls,
in a group, a constructive recrea-
tional program. Each troop is in
the charge of volunteer leaders who
take special Girl Scout training to
fit them for the weekly troop meet-
ings and outdoor activities. If Girl
Scouting is to be of real value to a
girl, she must be able to attend
meetings regularly. We feel that

of their time being "too scheduled."
