Mrs. Chester Wessling will serve as warden at the Palatine chapter O.E.S. Friday evening at their advance officers' night.

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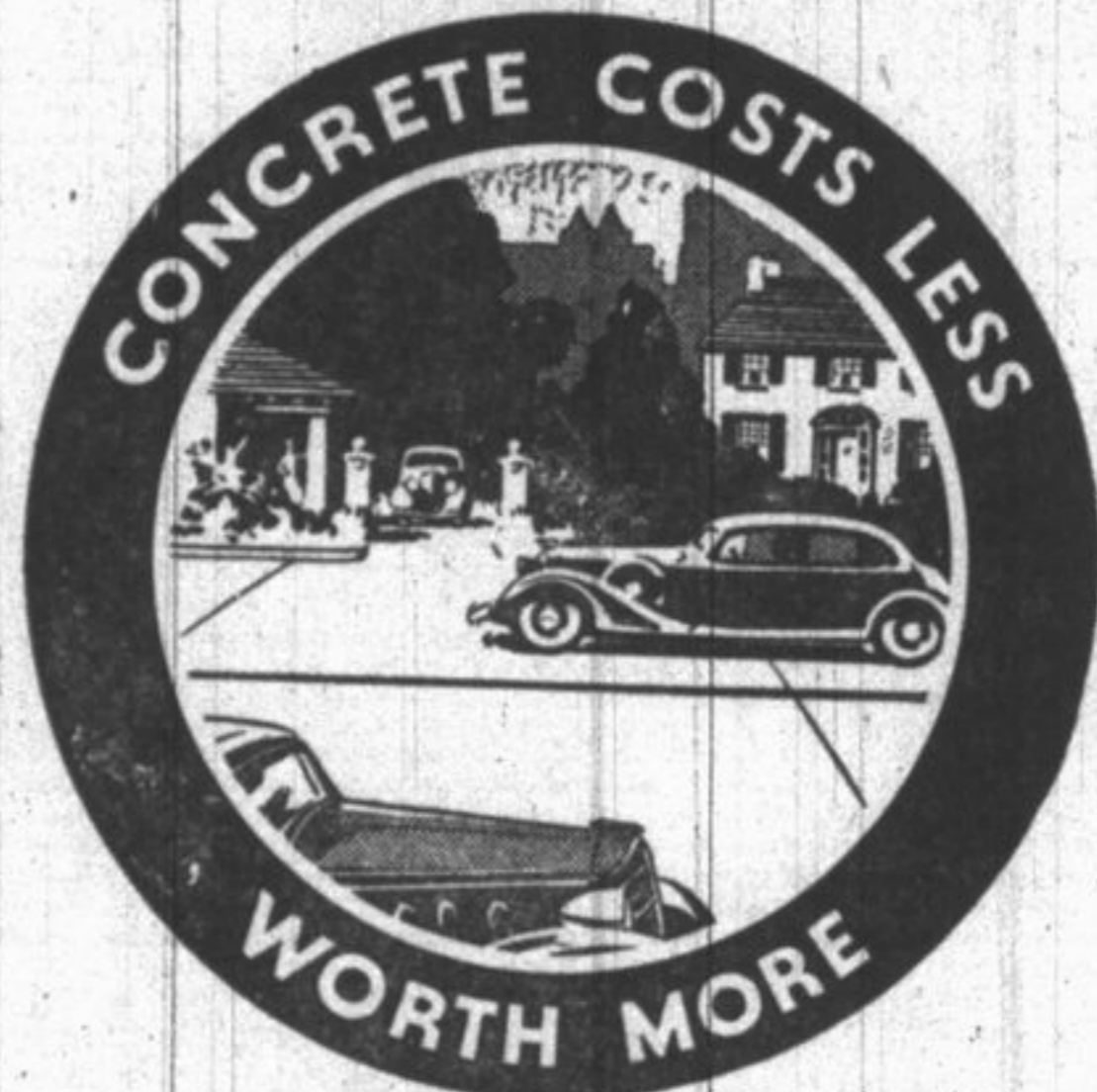
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
