(Continued from Page 1) both men and women from 7:30 to 8:30 Wednesday evenings, and a course for children from 4 to 5:30 on Wednesdays, give opportunity for would-be potters no matter what their free time or age.

Registration will be accepted all this week with definite work starting at the first class on Wednesday, Oct. 23. "Part of the never-ending fascination of work with clay," says Mrs. Harvey in speaking of her own interest in pottery, "is that we are studying the oldest of the arts, through it we follow man's effort toward greater comfort and beauty from the early days when he first noticed the holes in clay soil holding water from rains and consequently experimented with water jars for himself. After learning how to make vessels for cooking and keeping food and water, man went on to make vases and jars for beauty. The potter's wheels has even been in use since about 2000 B.C. as proved by wall paintings in the tomb of an Egyptian king of that period."

The education program at the YWCA also features another old art in modern form—modern dancing classes of Serena Seymour. Miss Seymour, who has studied with Harold Kreutzberg, Adolph Bohm, and at the Mary Wigham School in Berlin, is a Ravinia resident. She is now rehearsing with the Chicago Opera Ballet. Girls from 8 to 16 are already registered in her afternoon classes meeting on Tuesdays and Thursdays although there is no age limit as both younger and older students will benefit from the rhythmic exercises and body control taught. A pre-school class at a special fee is also forming for Tuesdays. The morning class is open to women on Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

In addition to the popular tap dancing class for children in which over sixty are enrolled, Miss Agnes Daly has an adult tap and gym class, with badminton playing, opening this week. She will also lead a folk dancing class group at the Y. Mrs. Lee Gatewood is chairman of the home hygiene free course in which seventy-five women and girls are already enrolled. A Red Cross nurse is conducting these demonstrations. Mrs. Lee Frank is the education chairman for all these activities.

"With such a varied program we hope many Highland Park, Deerfield, Ravinia, and Highwood girls and women will find new interests at their YWCA," says Mrs. Frank.
