John Fritsch, who has been ill at his home on Pfingsten Road, has been taken to a Chicago hospital for observation because of a very serious disease.

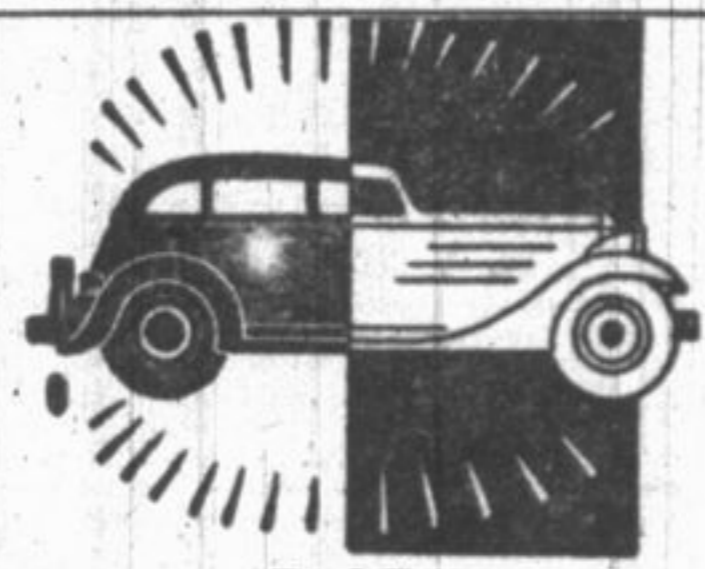
William Anderson and son Ralph and daughter, Mrs. Dean Bixler, of Villa Park spent Thursday at the Philip Scully Sr. home.

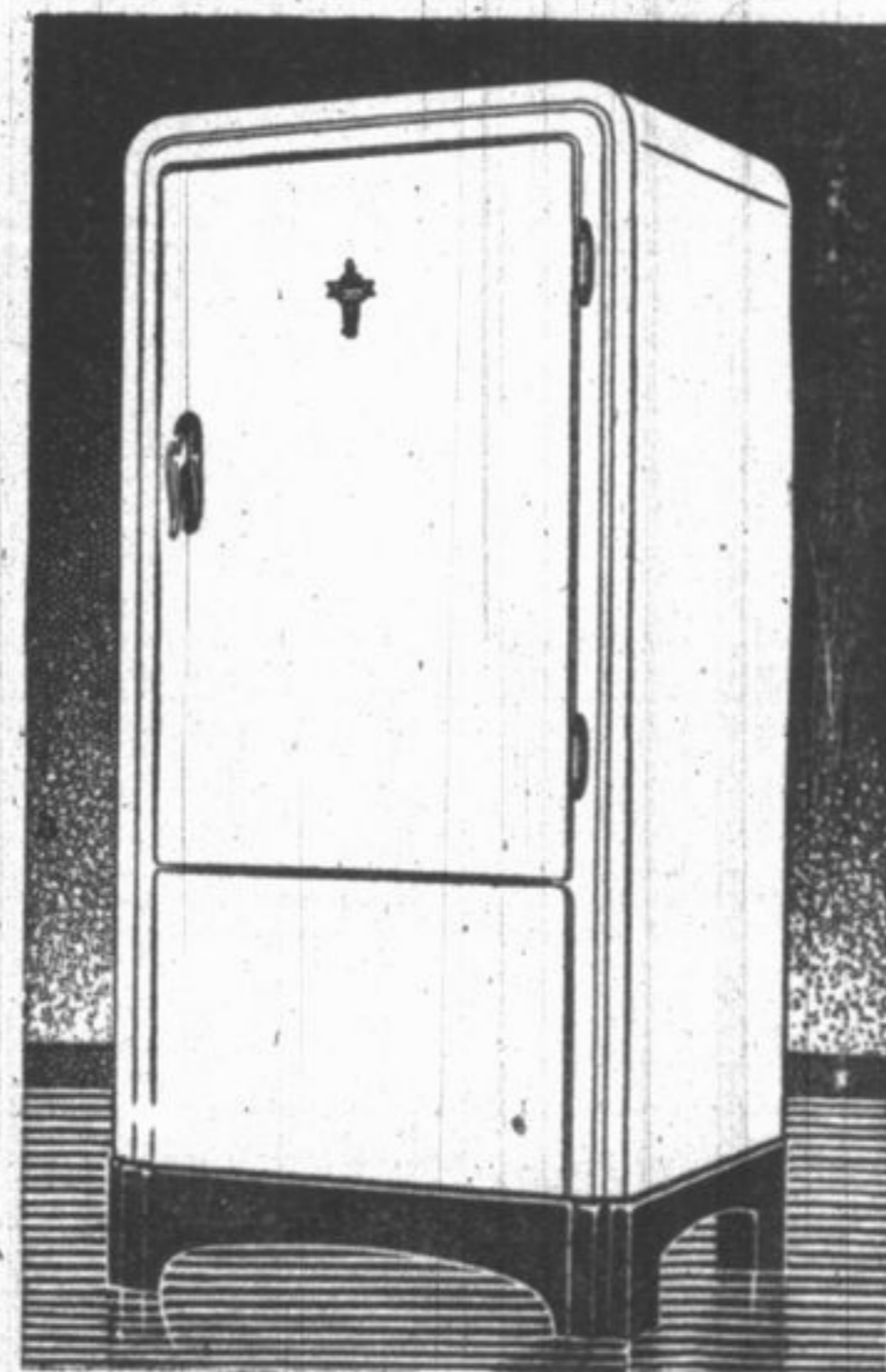
