

**PROCLAMATION
CITIZENSHIP DAY**

November 1st, 1935
Whereas, the Governor of Illinois has appointed a State-wide committee for the promotion of good citizenship and has proclaimed November 1st, 1935, as "Citizenship Day," and
Whereas, it is right and proper for the citizens of this municipality to cooperate with all efforts for the promotion of a deep and vital sense of good citizenship, and
Whereas, it is desirable for all of us from time to time to refresh our memories as to the deeper meanings and values of American Citizenship, and
Whereas, the promotion of good citizenship will not only revive an interest in governmental affairs, but will be conducive to the stability, good order, public peace and prosperity of this municipality, the State of Illinois and our Nation.

Now, Therefore, I, as Mayor of the Municipality of Highland Park, do hereby proclaim November 1, as "Citizenship Day" in this municipality and respectfully urge all of our citizens to reconcentrate and rededicate themselves to the continued improvement of governmental affairs.—Local, State and National.

Monday, October 28, has been designated as Navy Day, the anniversary of the establishment of the American Navy by the Continental Congress in 1775; and

This day will be observed by the citizens of this country as a tribute to the past and present services which the Navy of the United States has rendered to the Nation during one hundred and sixty years, and to the men who have responded in times of peril to the call to arms, and who stand ready at all times to uphold and defend the ideals and institutions of this great country.

Program for Safety Week**

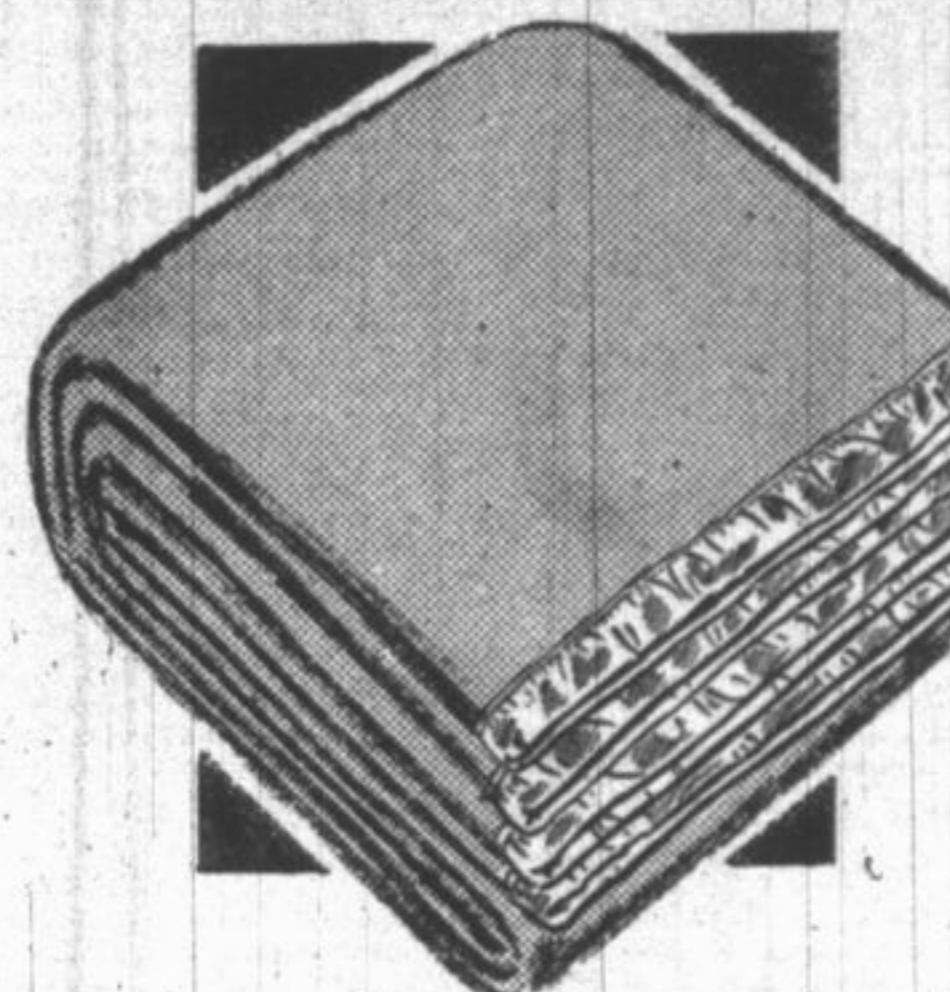
The P.T.A. of Ravinia school will give a special program in the school

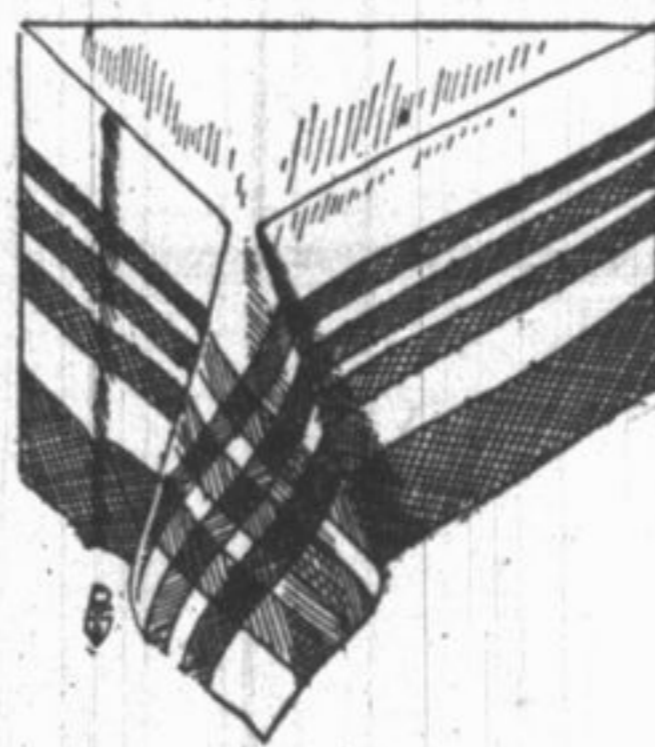

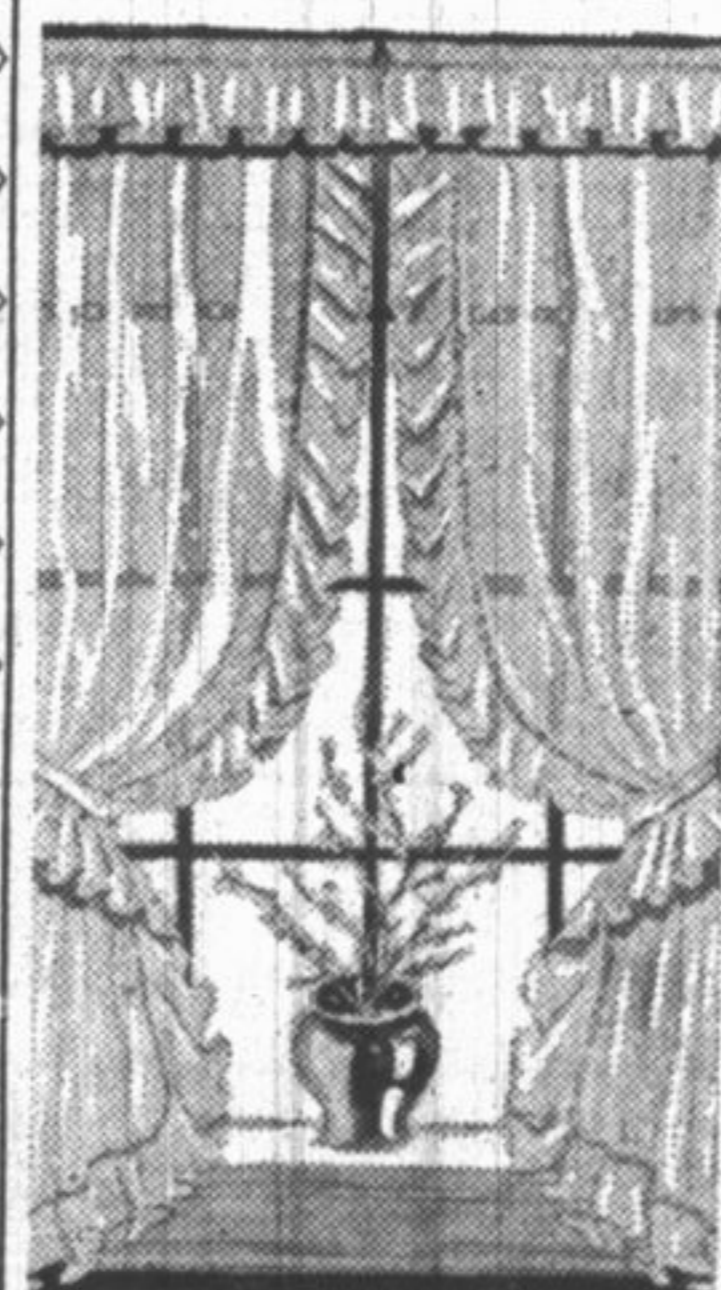
