

Within two years, another English Bible was published and definite steps were taken to seek the approval of the Government with the result that a revision, sponsored by Cromwell, was entrusted to Coverdale.

In 1604, King James called a conference of high and low churchmen, and accepted the suggestion of John Reynolds, an Oxford university professor, for another revision. This was the work of the most learned men of Oxford and Cambridge and is based upon Coverdale's Great Bible of 1539 through the Bishops Bible which had been used extensively although it was uneven in quality of translation because it had been a cooperative undertaking. The work, published as the result of the Hampton Court conference, is the King James version 1611, which is still the authorized English Bible, though it, too, has
