Speakers will urge support in five-minute addresses each evening during the drive, at the Alcyon theatre. The Highland Park, Waukegan, and Chicago newspapers, already generous in their support, will continue to give news of the campaign while it is in progress.

"Dodgers" will be distributed in the schools for an essay contest among grade school children on the subject "Why I Should Give to the Highland Park Community Chest."

Prizes for the best essays will be gift certificates for merchandise donated by Highland Park merchants.

A Community Chest newspaper in tabloid size will be distributed to the homes of the community by Boy Scouts soon after the campaign gets under way.

Efforts have been made to overlook no avenue which can be utilized to win interest and support to insure the success of the campaign.

THURSDAY CRASH CLAIMS TWO LIVES

Miss Anne Brindley and Miss Pauline Sonnastien Die from Injuries

Two lives were claimed by the crash last Thursday morning when the roadster driven by Miss Olive Nelson of Chicago ran into the rear of a truck parked on Skokie highway opposite the Bob O'Link Country club.

Miss Brindley died Thursday morning at 4:30, about an hour after the accident. Miss Sonnastien died at 12:15 a.m. Saturday.

The driver of the truck, Harry Demis, 24, of 324 S. Lavin street, Chicago, said that he was hauling a load of potatoes to Chicago and ran out of gas.

Miss Olive Nelson, 23, of 20 E. Huron street, Chicago, was driving the car and Miss Brindley and Miss Sonnastien were in the front seat with her and Misses Hadke and Keene were in the rumble seat of the small coupe.

According to two Cook county police who were escorting a Bowman Milk company truck to Chicago and witnessed the accident, Miss Nelson apparently did not see the lights on the truck, struck it a glancing blow and completely wrecked her car.

Miss Brindley was still living when she was pulled from the wreckage but her body was terribly crushed and she was bleeding profusely from deep gashes in her head and face.

Miss Sonnastien sustained fractures of both arms and legs, a possible skull fracture and was badly cut and bruised. Miss Radtke suffered fractures of her right wrist and several ribs and was cut and bruised. Miss Nelson sustained serious cuts and bruises while Miss Keene was bruised and badly shaken up.

All four of the girls, who retained consciousness through the accident, were hysterical when taken to the hospital and suffered terribly from shock.
