His birthday anniversary is a fitting time for the publication of his notebook, a volume which has just appeared in the book stores. "Mark Twain's Notebook," prepared for publication with comments by Albert Bigelow Paine is autobiog-

vivid form—day—today life recorded as it was thought and felt. Huck Finn and Tom Sawyer need no introduction, their names are as well-known as their creator's. Of his more serious and lesser-known books, Carl Van Doren says, "If his broader humorous writings had matched the temper of his own age, his graver more speculative and more rebellious writings had been remarkably prophetic of the age which was to follow."

 Illinois Library Association
 The thirty-ninth annual conference of the Illinois Library association is being held this week, Oc-

tober 30, 31 and November 1, at Rockford, Illinois.

An important part of the program centers about the recently enacted appropriation to aid Illinois libraries, \$600,000 having been voted by the State Legislature to provide, over a two-year period, an emergency book fund for the 279 libraries of the state.

Mr. Hughes, as Secretary of State is also State librarian and was designated by the Legislature to apportion the fund. An advisory committee of five will assist him. Michael F. Gallagher, trustee of the Highland Park library and legislative chairman of the Illinois Library association is a member of this committee.
