1000 ATTEND H. P. CITIZENSHIP RALLY

Jeanette Canright Wins Essay Contest Sponsored by Local D. A. R.

Over 1000 residents of Highland Park attended the Citizenship Rally held Friday evening, Nov. 1, in the Deerfield-Shields High School auditorium. The event was sponsored by the Americanization committee of the high school district.

Jeanette Canright of Highland Park won the essay contest award of \$25 offered by the Daughters of the American Revolution. The competition was open to any resident of the district who attained majority during the year 1935 and the subject was "Good Citizenship." Mrs. Carleton Harkness, regent of the North Shore chapter, D.A.R., made the presentation. Harry Aiston, chairman of the Americanism committee of the Highland Park Post, presented the Dumaresq Spencer medal to Jean Simons, winner of the essay contest for high school students of the district on the subject "The Benefits of American Citizenship."

Civic heads of every community in the school district except Highwood attended the gathering. John O. Meyers, Jr., mayor of Highwood, could not attend because of the regular meeting of the city council.

Those who attended were Mayor William M. Dooley of Highland Park, Mayor Francis Manierre of Lake Forest, Mayor Elmer Vliet of Lake Bluff, and Mayor Harry Wing of Deerfield. In addition, representatives of the majority of the civic clubs and fraternal orders of the school district, the clergy and heads of the school system were present.

Under direction of Edwin Gilroy, commander of the Dumaresq Spencer Post of Highland Park, representatives of six posts went through the Americanism ritual. The posts cooperating were Highland Park, Highwood, Deerfield, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff and Evans-Watkins (the last made up of employes of the North Shore Line).

Rev. Thomas Anderson, pastor of the Wellington Avenue Congregational church, Chicago delivered the principal address on the subject: "America the Beautiful."

The Junior Legion drum and bugle corps of Highwood played several patriotic selections, and George Scheuchpnflug, director of Community Service, led the audience in group singing.

SNYDER LECTURES OPEN NOVEMBER 13

Highland Park Woman's Club Opens Lecture Series To Public

When Professor Franklin Bliss Snyder, Dean of the Graduate school of Northwestern university, and head of the English department, speaks at the Highland Park Woman's club on Wednesday morning, November 13, at 10:30 o'clock, his listeners will be not only the members of the Highland Park Woman's club, but all those women in the community who are interested in hearing a speaker of Professor Snyder's eminence discuss the "English and American Novel in Recent Years."

The first lecture, on Wednesday, November 13, will be a presentation of "The Great Victorians." The two succeeding lectures will consider "Arnold Bennett, John Galsworthy, Joseph Conrad and Thomas Hardy" and "The American Novel During the Past Two Decades."

Professor Snyder is coming to Highland Park through the efforts of the Fine Arts department of which Mrs. James I. Loeb is chairman. The department is presenting these lectures to all club members without charge; but there is a nominal fee for non-members. Local T. B. Board Members Prepare Special Letters

Expressing the hope that Highland Park will again respond generously to the 1935 Christmas Seal Sale drive, Mrs. F. B. Hitchcock and Mrs. George W. Childs, two of the local board members of the Lake County Tuberculosis association are preparing letters to be sent residents of this city.

The work of the Lake County Tuberculosis association is entirely supported by the sale of Christmas Seals in this county. Because the appeals for two dollars or less have been so seriously curtailed in the past few years, board members of the association are writing personal letters to friends urging them to "give a little more" in 1935, in order that the chest clinics and health education work be continued full force.

Over 400 examinations were made at the monthly clinics in 1934 and already in 1935, 3770 were made with two more clinics to be held. The monthly course of study in Health Education is now being used in fifteen elementary schools in the county.

The Tuberculosis association is not included in the organizations receiving benefit from the Community Chest drive. Christmas Seals alone finance this work in Lake county and they will be mailed out to over 1800 residents of Highland Park at Thanksgiving time.
