Arden Shore
Imagine the largest free camp in the world — a camp of nearly 23 acres housing normally 500 women and children, pressed to 650 last year — a camp of beautiful woods, comfortable lodges, a superb bathing beach, beautiful landscaping — and you have Arden Shore.

Imagine a mother who has never had close communion with a tree or with grass even, who has been burdened with child and household cares to the exclusion of everything else — and you have a typical mother, exhausted and nagging, who seeks the freedom of Arden Shore.

Imagine a child actually hungry, whose environment is conducive only to sordidness and mental insecurity — and you have a typical child longing for this camp, and for a prolongation of its holiday.

Five hundred is the normal ca-

capacity. These are drawn mostly from the charity organizations and hospitals of Chicago. Two weeks is the average stay in camp, although these are necessarily some exceptions in the case of convalescent children. During these two weeks a mother has no care whatsoever, not even a worry about the next meal. Even her babies are cared for in the nursery and kindergarten by trained attendants. And the older girls, who at home have the care of younger brothers and sisters, are in a separate camp by themselves, free of their charges.

Arden Shore means for these exhausted mothers and hungry children complete rest, three good square meals of excellent food a day with milk between for the children. It means fresh air and sunshine, bathing in clean water and playing in clean sand. It means sleeping in

a comfortable, clean bed. It means happiness.

Dorcas Home

The loss of a parent — with the all too often attendant circumstances of poverty — breaks up many homes and makes it imperative that some one look after the children while the remaining parent seeks work.

Dorcas Home was established for the purpose of stepping into the breach caused by such domestic tragedies by caring for half-orphaned children who temporarily must have help and shelter.

Dorcas Home has capacity for caring for between thirty-five and forty children. Each child who comes to the Home must have some financial backing, that is a minimum of fifteen dollars a month must be paid by the parent or interested relative or friends of the child. The children stay at the Home for various periods or until adjustments can be made so that they may return to their families again.

While part of expenses of the Home are met through the low board fees the rest must be secured by gifts to the Home of money, food and clothing.

Dorcas Home is just two miles west of Highland Park at the edge of Deerfield. It has comfortable buildings and eight acres of fine vegetable and fruit gardens, and space for play for the children to enjoy with good school privileges close by.

More children from Highland Park and its immediate vicinity have been cared for at Dorcas Home than from any other community and in return it is only right that Highland Park should show real interest in and help generously through the Community Chest towards its financial support.

One of the finest testimonials to Dorcas Home as a real and much-loved home lies in the eager coming back each year of many former children to spend a holiday at the "Home."

Some of the children of Dorcas Home who graduated from Deerfield-Shields High School in Highland Park while living at the Home have won scholarship at colleges — chiefly through all-around ability and excellent scholarship. One of these is now a senior at Lake Forest College, another is a junior at Purdue — both are working their way through their respective schools and maintaining fine grades. Dorcas Home is justly proud of these children and happy in the privilege of having helped them.

The "Home" maintains a fine, wholesome atmosphere in comfortable surroundings and every effort is made to give the children a real understanding mother's care.

Baby Feeding Clinic

The Highland Park Baby Feeding Clinic was started in October 1925 to give all the babies in Highland Park and surrounding communities the opportunity for a right start in life. It had been found that the parents of many children were unable to provide for the special physical and diet examinations which are so necessary if a child is to develop properly both physically and mentally.

From a small start this clinic has developed today to a point where

1800 babies are being carefully examined, weighed, and given the proper diet formulas.

The clinic is conducted at the Highland Park Hospital on Mondays and Thursdays of each week with an average attendance of from 40 to 45 babies. Dr. M. D. McNeal is the attending physician, and Mrs. John Huhnke is the attending nurse.

The babies are brought by their mothers from homes all over Lake County. In most cases the parents are able to supply the diet needs but in cases where the family cannot afford it, the clinic furnishes cod liver oil, Dextrin-Maltose, and oranges. The age limit of the children examined by the clinic is 18 months and under.

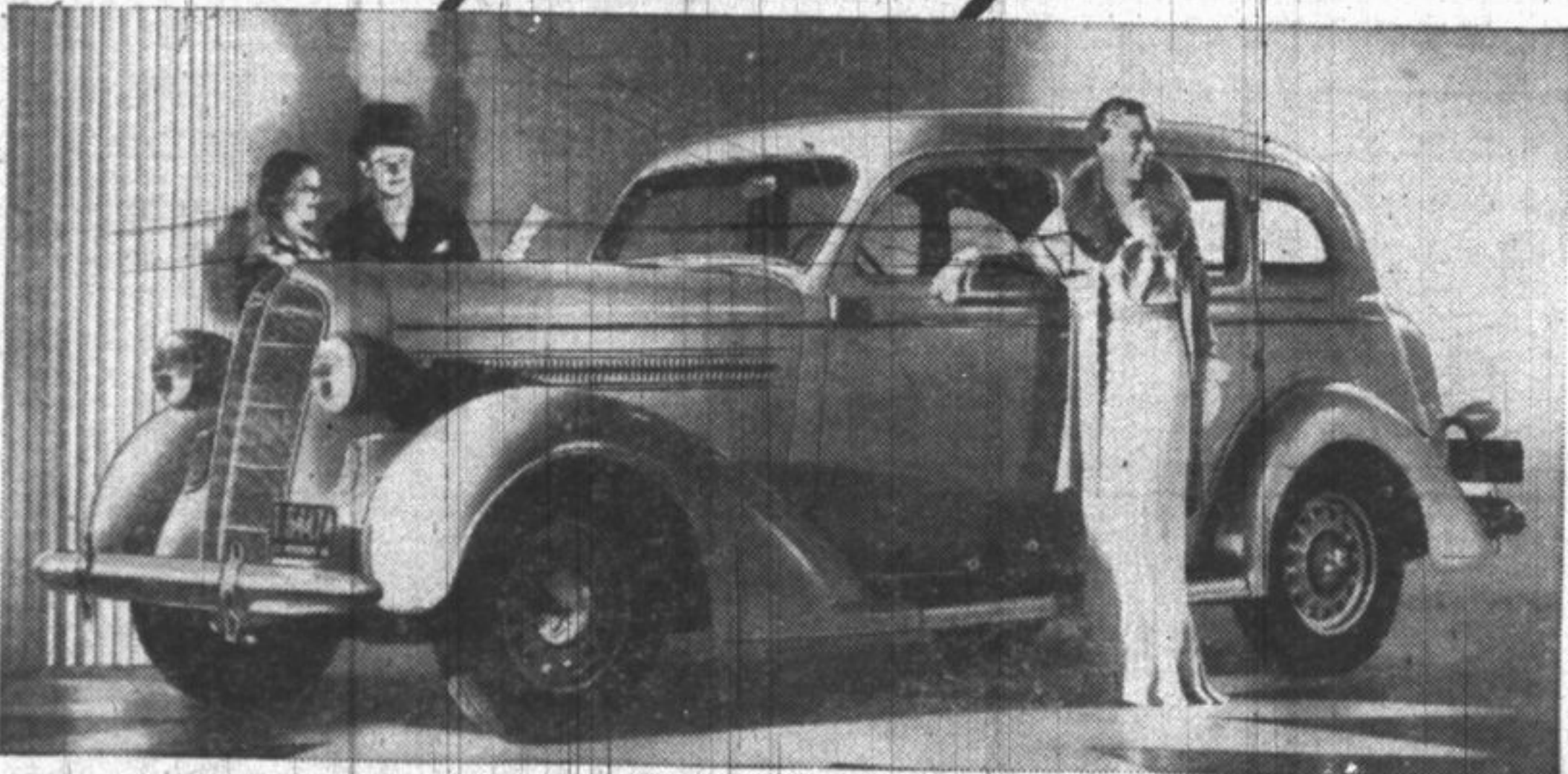
