

List Chamber Music Concerts for Season

The North Shore Chamber Music association will open its season with a concert by the Gordon String quartet on Sunday, Nov. 17 in the Kenilworth Assembly hall.

Jacques Gordon is well known here as the brilliant and beloved concertmaster of the Chicago Symphony orchestra who resigned his post to devote himself entirely to his quartet which now ranks with the finest in the world.

The association will also present this season, Barrere, Salzedo and Britt in joint recital. Georges Barrere has called "that monarch of flute players." Stokowski writes of Carlos Salzedo, "He is at once virtuoso, artist, composer and developer of the latent possibilities of the harp." Horace Britt too, holds a high place in the musical world, having appeared recently as solo cellist with the Barcelona Symphony orchestra of which the peerless Pablo Casals is conductor.

The two concerts following the Gordon quartet will be given by the Philharmonic String quartet of Chicago which is composed of four members of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, all of whom have been prominent for a number of years as soloists and chamber music players. They have often played in Kenilworth and have always been received with enthusiasm.

The concerts will be given on Sunday afternoons at 4 o'clock in the Kenilworth Assembly hall: the Gordon String quartet on November 17; the Philharmonic Quartet of Chicago, January 5, and again on March 15, and the recital of Barrere-Salzedo-Britt May 3.

Deerfield Troops Win Two Awards At Show

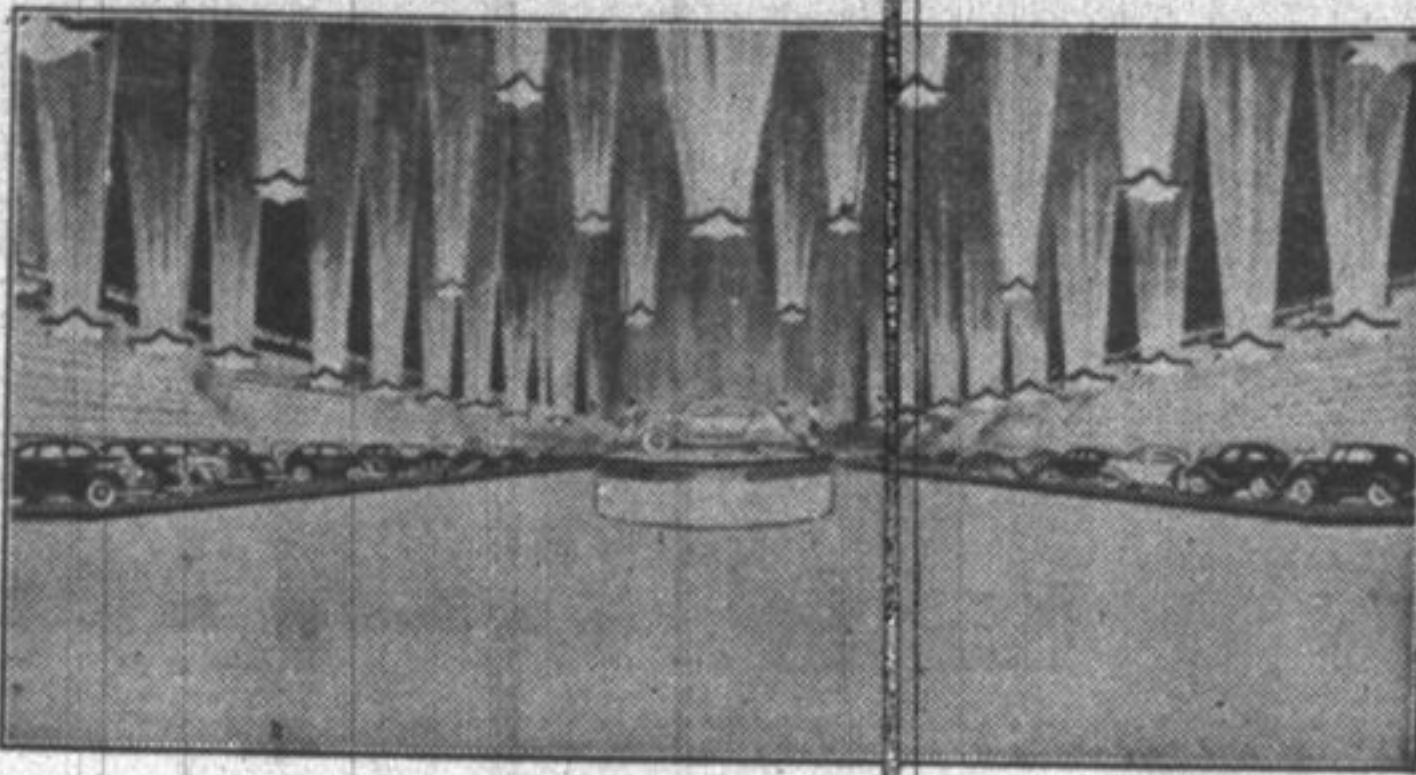

"Hall of Stars" decorative motif which will feature big automobile show

A \$40,000 decorative motif is to be the brilliant setting for Chicago's 36th annual Automobile Show to be held during the week of Nov. 16 to 23, at International Amphitheatre, Halsted and 43rd streets.

The show itself, including decorations, is to be a \$3,000,000 enterprise. It will be in reality a pageant of transportation, staged in Chicago's newest and most modern exposition building. Because of its comprehensiveness and showmanship that will be unfolded, this event is being widely hailed as the "greatest automobile show on earth."

From the standpoint of size, with 255,000 square feet of floor space, the forthcoming show will be without parallel in the history of events of its kind. On view will be some 300 models of the 1936 cars ranging from less than \$500 to \$20,000 in price; motor trucks, home and truck trailers and accessories.

A highlight in showmanship will be dramatic presentations each afternoon and evening in the central arena, with each performance depicting the newest in motor cars and winter furs. The latter will represent a value of about \$500,000. The style show has been arranged through co-operation of the Associated Car Industries of Chicago.

Music which has been lacking at shows during the past five years, will again be a feature, furnished by a new orchestra as an accompaniment to the performances in the arena.

Known as the "Hall of Stars," the ornate decorative and lighting scheme will be both unique and appropriate. It will be a way of calling attention to the fact that every 1936 car model is a stellar creation. Stars will play upon each model on the stage and around the enclosure of the arena.

National attention will be focused upon this biggest of all automobile shows, with dealers, manufacturers and motorists from all over the country flocking to Chicago to see what's newest in motordom and showmanship.

APPOINTMENT OF CHAPLAINS IN THE REGULAR ARMY

Examinations of applicants for appointment as chaplains in the grade of first lieutenant in the Regular Army under the provisions of AR 605-30, and the following special conditions, will be held on Jan. 28 and 29, 1936.

In order to provide for existing and prospective denominational vacancies, applications will be restricted to clergymen duly accredited to the following denominations:

- Baptist, South.
- Methodist Episcopal.
- Missouri Synod, Lutheran.
- United Brethren.

Eligibility to compete in the examination will be confined to candidates who are at time of preliminary examination —

a. Male citizens of the United States between the ages of 23 and 34 years.

b. Regularly ordained, duly accredited by and in good standing with some religious denomination or organization which holds an appointment of chaplain appointments in accordance with the needs of the service.

c. Graduates of both a 4-year college course and a 3-year theological seminary course.

d. Actively engaged in the ministry as the principal occupation in life and credited with 3 years' experience therein.

Formal applications on W.D. A.G.O. Form No. 62 accompanied by at least three letters of recommendation, small photographs of applicants, and proper ecclesiastical endorsements must reach the Adjutant General not later than Jan. 8, 1936. Applications received after that date will not be considered.

Blank forms for applications may be obtained from the Commanding General, Sixth Corps Area, Post Office building, Chicago, Illinois.
