H. P. BONDHOLDERS PLAN FORECLOSURE

Bondholders Committee Considers Drastic Action on Defaulted Properties

The probability of the foreclosure of some of the special assessment bonds issued by the City of Highland Park against certain property in Highland Park was seen in the action taken last week by the Highland Park Special Assessment Bondholders' committee...

A general meeting of bondholders was held at the city hall about a month ago, at which meeting it was attempted to ascertain the wishes of the bondholders. Subsequently a meeting of the Bondholders' committee was held, attended by Mr. Harold Florsheim, Mr. Benjamin F. Lewis, and Mr. H. F. Van Steenderen...

At that meeting it was decided to proceed with foreclosure proceedings against special assessments 308, 335, 341 and 343. The committee now has a large number of bonds deposited, or available to it, in each of the above issues...

The committee determined that as matters now stand it does not quite have a sufficient deposit of bonds to warrant it in proceeding with foreclosure, and a further determination was made that the committee should not proceed with foreclosure unless it was the wish of bondholders that this be done...

It is the contention of the committee that certain large property owners, non-residents of Highland Park, are refusing to pay their special assessments and will not pay the special assessments on large subdivision properties until forced to do so...

A representative of the committee pointed out that not all of the properties in the mentioned assessment-districts are in default but that a large majority of them are...

\$31,840 SECURED IN CHEST DRIVE

All workers were of the opinion that a splendid job has been accomplished to date considering the many inclement days during the set period of the campaign, which made it impossible for the workers to see all of their prospects promptly.

"The total number of subscribers to date is 1767," according to Herbert E. Kerber, general campaign chairman, "with approximately 1500 prospects yet to be reported upon." "The three hundred loyal workers in the campaign will make every effort during the next week to contact all remaining prospects," said Mr. Kerber. To lighten the task for these volunteer workers who have given generously of their time and efforts, prospects with whom subscription cards have been left can aid materially in bringing this big civic undertaking to a successful close by handing or sending their subscription to the worker who called upon them, at once.

N. S. TRUST WILL PAY ANOTHER 10%

1500 Checks, Totaling Over \$43,000 To Be Mailed Immediately

Fifteen hundred checks totaling over \$43,000 will be mailed out to depositors of the North Shore Trust and Savings bank, it was announced yesterday by Ernest S. Gail, attorney for William L. O'Connell, receiver of the bank and S. P. Johnson, deputy receiver.

Mr. Gail stated that he had received the order to give out the checks, which represent a 10 per cent dividend, yesterday morning.

This last dividend raises the total paid by the bank to 68 per cent, as two previous dividends totaling 68 per cent of the bank's indebtedness have already been distributed. A previous dividend, which included payment in full on all accounts of \$2 or less has reduced the original number of about 2,000 creditors to approximately 1,500.

This dividend, Mr. Gail said, is made up entirely of funds collected by the receiver, no stockholders liability funds being included. He also stated that there will be further dividends, but that it is not possible, at present, to determine exactly how much will eventually be paid off.

Arnold Gingrich To Speak on "Symptoms Of An Editor"

"Symptoms of an Editor" holds promise of interesting possibilities when placed in the hands of a man known to be as entertaining a speaker as Mr. Arnold Gingrich, "Editor of Esquire," who will address the Highland Park Woman's club at the regular meeting, Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 19, at 2 o'clock.

When the editor of a magazine for men comes to talk to a Woman's club, some delightfully refreshing viewpoints should be developed.

Mr. Gingrich is a graduate of the University of Michigan. He is a young man just entering his thirties. "Cast Down the Laurel" is his first non-commercial writing. Among the groups before whom Mr. Gingrich has lectured are: The Walt Whitman association, Chicago Foundation for Literature, Society of Midland Authors, Chicago Fiction Guild, Chicago Book and Play club, various journalism fraternities and classes at Northwestern, Columbia and other universities, and many Chambers of Commerce in the middle west.

Since, oftentimes, the things a man enjoys in his leisure hours afford an entertaining insight on his personality, it may be of interest to those who plan to hear Mr. Gingrich on Tuesday afternoon to know that an interview with his secretary revealed his hobbies as "creative thinking and fiddling"; "book buying," being a collector of rare bindings and first editions; and "year-round fishing"—he flew eight thousand miles to catch nine fish. HERMAN BLACK DIES HERE ON SATURDAY

Former Publisher of Chicago American Dies After Short Illness

Herman Black, chairman of the board of the Evening American Publishing company, Chicago, died early last Saturday in his home at 1616 Dean avenue, Highland Park. He was 68 years old.

The publisher had been ill for six weeks. At his bedside when he died were his wife, Stella, and his two children, Miss Mary Black and John Herman Black, manager of the Wisconsin News in Milwaukee.

Black was born in Milwaukee, July 12, 1867, and his own sketch of his career, characteristically terse, includes these lines: "Parents, John and Mary Black; schooling, Fifth Ward school of Milwaukee. Employment, 13 years as advertising manager of the Milwaukee Journal, five years as advertising manager for Schuster & Co. of Milwaukee, two years as advertising manager of the Boston Store of Milwaukee."

In 1895 he married Miss Stella Apple of Milwaukee, who bore him two children. The family made its home in Milwaukee until Chicago called.

He was 49 when he was called to Chicago by William Randolph Hearst, and for 17 years served as publisher of The Chicago Evening American. He was promoted to head the board in 1933.

He was almost as active socially as in business. He found time for the affairs of his half dozen clubs, for his religious life as a member of the North Shore Jewish Congregation, for participation in community affairs, and for his hobby—painting.

It was in June, 1933 that he was promoted from the position of publisher to that of chairman of the board, a position which was his until he died.
