Deerfield C of C and Village Board Discuss Ordinance

The mayor and members of the village board were invited guests of the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce at a special dinner meeting held at Shugrue's Restaurant, Wednesday, Nov. 6. This special meeting was called for the purpose of considering a petition signed by members of nearly every business establishment in the village requesting the chamber of commerce to petition the village board to reconsider an ordinance recently passed authorizing the weighing of trucks passing through the village over the state highways.

After refreshments were served it was pointed out by various members of the petitioners that since the practice of weighing trucks had been started their business had depreciated all the way from 20 to 50 per cent, the gas stations and restaurants suffering the most loss. That drivers who had been their regular customers for a long period of years were now passing through without stopping. That there were now many vacant stores and it was not at this time a good policy for the village to antagonize or obstruct what business there was by weighing trucks passing over state highways built and maintained by the state and charged by the laws of the state with the regulation of traffic upon these highways.

It was further pointed out by one member of the chamber that he had been to Libertyville and was told by one of the officials there that Libertyville had discontinued the weighing of trucks owing principally to the same conditions complained of by the business establishments in Deerfield.

Others seemed to think that this kind of practice in other places had come to be looked upon as a sort of local racket giving those places a rather unsavory reputation especially with the traveling public and that whatever profit there was in the business was hardly worth the trouble and expense of putting it into general practice, especially when it was the business of the state and could be regulated by the state without casting any reflection upon the good name of the village or causing any such loss to business as was stated by the petitioners.

It was forcefully argued by the members of the village board that there were numerous debts and expenses that had to be met and that if these drivers of trucks and cars were violating the state laws the village was perfectly justified in passing ordinances providing for their arrest and punishment. That if trucks damaged the streets it caused both difficulty and delay in getting them repaired by the state.

It was, however, admitted by members of the village board that there might be some question regarding the advisability of too much activity on the part of the village's endeavoring to regulate traffic upon highways built and controlled by the state.

It was finally agreed that both the chamber of commerce and the village board should refer the matter to the property highway authority governing such matters for their advice regarding the law and

best policy of its enforcements. The mayor stated that he had been recently advised that the motor vehicle laws passed by the last legislature provided that all vehicles along state highways must be parallel with the curb and that no further diagonal parking would be permitted and that this law must be put into practice as soon as possible. The meeting was conducted in a most friendly and co-operative spirit and adjourned with the feeling that both the chamber, the village board, and business interests of the community might benefit by such co-operation.—Contributed.
