**Standard Oil Receives Four Safety Awards**

For outstanding accomplishments in accident prevention in the petroleum industry, the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana received four American Petroleum Institute Accident Prevention awards at the 16th annual meeting of the institute in Los Angeles, Calif., according to information received today at the company's general offices in Chicago. Its record was unique in accident prevention work. The certificates were presented by Axtell Byles, institute president, before 3,000 delegates. Allan Jackson, vice-president in charge of sales of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, accepted the awards earned by the wholesale and retail marketing divisions, and Edward J. Bullock, vice-president in charge of purchases, accepted the all-department and refining division safety certificates.

Twenty-two companies received the 32 American Petroleum Institute Accident Prevention awards this year. Standard of Indiana has earned major honors every year since the awards were established in 1932.

The play portrays the amusing situations arising from the effects of a vacation in Paris of two middle western American women who saw Paris, as they felt it should be seen. The cast includes many actors who have appeared before in local productions.

Miss Jean Whinnery will make her Players debut as Lucille Lingular, the wife of an average American business man. Her husband will be played by Walter Watson who has appeared before in other productions. Emmet Sykes, friend of the Lingular family and companion of Lucille on the trip to Paris is played by Sara Ann McClernan who has been with the Players for four seasons. Her daughter Peggy is portrayed by Mary Lou Hickman who appeared last season in "Dark Tower." Charles O'Donnell will portray the part of Ronald Derbyshire, an English poet and friend of Lucille Lingular, whom she met in Paris. Robert Arnold, who joined the Players in time to take the lead in "Mr. Pim Passes By" and who has appeared in all productions since then, will take the part of Hyppolitus Lomi, a gentleman of mixed parentage whose continental airs easily impress Emmet Sykes. taken by Elinor McNabb, Doctor Barackman, and Buddy Owiess. The play is under the direction of Miss Elyse Rinkenberger, dramatic instructor at Deerfield-Shields high school. Miss Rinkenberger has had extensive experience at the Children's Theatre and other dramatic leagues of the North Shore and in Chicago.
