**Ishimoto, Shizue—**  
**FACING TWO WAYS**  
Baroness Ishimoto was born the daughter of the age-old aristocracy of Japan, but her father had become interested in Western ways, and though as a girl she was taught the arts of the Japanese lady, flower arrangement and the tea ritual, she also played tennis and learned Swedish gymnastics. Her husband was a Liberal and took his wife to America and Europe where in time she became an ardent feminist and advocate of birth control. This charmingly written autobiography reveals both sides of her life and the life of Japan during the years of transition from feudalism to modernism.

**Lehr, Elizabeth—**  
**KING LEHR & THE GILDED AGE**  
If the book was only of Lehr, there would be no reason whatever for its existence. But it contains a running account of the social history of the nineties of the leading people, their homes and lives, of the gorgeous parties and entertainments of this period that now seem so remote and impossible. They knew everybody and went everywhere and the inside knowledge, anecdotes and incidents are entertaining. There is more or less about European society and functions and, of course, the war. The book is well written, and one leaves it with admiration for the author's strength of character.

**Ydewalle, Charles D.—**  
**ALBERT AND THE BELGIANS**  
The author of this biography of Belgium's great king, is a Belgium journalist who as a child played with the king's children and later accompanied Albert on many of his travels. The book is not a formal biography but a "sheaf of memories" stressing the personal side of Albert's life and character.

**Watson, Francis—**  
**THE LIFE AND TIMES OF CATHERINE DE' MEDICI**  
History of the period is combined with biography in the life story of Catherine, daughter-in-law of Francis I, who, after the death of Henry II, acted as regent of France during troubled years of religious revolution and civil wars. Her unscrupulous policies and her generally unadmirable character, are not palliated, but the treatment is not sensational.

**Linke, Lilo—**  
**RESTLESS DAYS**  
The author of "Tale Without End" gives the story of her own early life and that of her people. She begins with that day in 1914, when as a child of eight, she returned to Berlin from a holiday in East Prussia and learns that Germany is at war. After a description of the harrowing war years, and the reconstruction period, she closes with 1933, when she left her family and her country.

**Sandoz, Mari—**  
**OLD JULES**  
Jules Sandoz, the author's father, was a Nebraska pioneer, a Swiss immigrant who went west in 1884 and opened up new territory. The book is an unsparring revelation of a man who was brutal, vindictive, and conceited, but endowed with a vision greater than that of his neighbors, and with a stamina that withstood hardships that broke other settlers and drove many of them to desperation, murder, or insanity. Realistic frontier history by a daughter who, even while she suffered from her father's callous nature, realized it had elements of greatness to partly redeem its cruelty.

**Conrad, Mrs. Jessie—**  
**JOSEPH CONRAD AND HIS CIRCLE**  
A record of Conrad's married life from 1894 to his death in 1924. Ill health, lack of money, and an irascible temper made living with a genius difficult and Mrs. Conrad gives a matter-of-fact account of domestic details. Less of literary affairs than the title indicates, though some of Conrad's associates are the subjects of frank characterizations. It is a one-sided picture not intentionally harsh, but limited in its view.

**Nicholson, Harold George—**  
**DWIGHT MORROW**  
Mr. Nicholson has had the advantages of access to family records and of association with both family and friends that have been of invaluable assistance in keeping the book simple and natural in the handling of its flowing material. Few who have an interest in international affairs can fail to be stimulated by this record of an eminent career.

**Linn, James Weber—**  
**JANE ADDAMS**  
The authorized biography of the

noted humanitarian and peace worker, by her nephew. Though written out of intimate knowledge and with genuine affection, it is not a family memoir, for the biographer remains objective throughout. Notable for its understanding of motives, though it attempts no evaluation of her services.

**Winkler, John Kennedy—**  
**THE DU PONT DYNASTY**  
Mr. Winkler's sharp saga squanders neither tear nor perfume on any of the generations that have kept the family and its fortune growing since 1800. But neither does he ignore the good works, the expression of noblesse oblige, that have come from this succession of successful manufacturers, most of whom more than kept up with their separate times.

**Howard of Penrith, Esme William**  
**THEATRE OF LIFE**  
Written for his children, these reminiscences of a former British ambassador to the United States are intimate and unassuming in style. The book covers the years from 1863 to 1905, the author's childhood, education, and early diplomatic career, his courtship of an Italian princess and his marriage.
