Cold weather, prompts the housewife to do more in the kitchen, new and more attractive dishes to set before the family are her problems.

Many of our old dishes will take on newness, when garnished with watercress, parsley or radish roses. These all lend a new air to old foods.

Florida recipes will be given you in this issue, some delicious, some even tantalizing, all nutritious and healthful. With the new crop of fruits and vegetables, try some of these delightful recipes.

Tomato with Avocado Dressing.

Fresh tomatoes peeled and coring, stuffed with celery, chopped fine. Use Avocado dressing made by mashing smoothly avocado pulp into lemon or lime juice and adding a little salt. Pour over tomato. Serve on lettuce leaf.

Avocado with Tomato Dressing

Half fresh avocado, peeled and seeded. Peel and wash fresh tomato and put through a potato ricer, season with a suggestion of tobasco. Fill cavity with the dressing.

India Salad

Grated fresh coconut on hearts of lettuce served with hot French dressing.

Ponce De Leon Salad

Scoop out a little of the top heart of a Florida artichoke. Fill with a French dressing combined with chopped pimiento, parsley, finely minced celery and the mashed pulp

of the artichoke. Serve with a thin cheese sandwich or cheese wafer as a course of a luncheon.

Carrot Souffle

1 cup carrots, boiled and mashed
1 tablespoon minced onion
1 cup medium white sauce
2 eggs

Salt and paprika.
Add the carrots, the onion and the seasoning to the white sauce, then add the beaten egg yolks. Beat the whites until they are stiff. Fold them in lightly to the first mixture and turn this into a buttered baking dish. Set the dish in a pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven 275 degrees F., for 30 minutes and serve at once.

Citrus Cocktail

(Serves 8-10)
1/4 cup lemon juice
1/4 cup orange juice
1/4 cup grapefruit juice
1/4 cup sugar, dissolved in water
Few grains of salt
Cracked ice
Mint sprigs.

Combine fruit juices, salt and water. Pour over cracked ice in cocktail glasses and serve garnished with mint sprigs.

Grapefruit Cocktail

Combine grapefruit pulp with grapes stuffed with pecans; squeeze orange juice over mixture and serve in half grapefruit hull on a bed of endive. Top salad with mayonnaise (thinned with cream).
