William Dooley, honorary president of the Chest led the assembled group of workers and citizens in a rousing "Victory" cheer.

Distribute Funds to Agencies The Board of Directors of the "Chest" at its meeting Monday evening, on being advised by Treasurer Robert A. Bryant that 70 per cent of the total subscriptions made to the "Chest" during the campaign had been paid in cash, authorized a disbursement to the twelve agencies composing the Chest in an amount equal to 70 per cent of the total allocation of each agency, to be made at once. Additional payments will be authorized as funds collected from subscriptions are available.

Credit to Volunteer Workers More than 350 citizens took an active part in the campaign and Chairman Herbert E. Kerber of the General Campaign committee gave high praise to the loyal service of these volunteer workers to the board of directors of the "Chest" at their meeting Monday evening. The following resolution offered by him was unanimously adopted:

"Be It Resolved, that the Board of Directors of the Highland Park Community Chest extend a sincere and cordial vote of thanks to all participants in the campaign which has just been successfully concluded. The civic service so generously rendered is especially significant in this first annual campaign because by helping this campaign to a successful conclusion the participants have laid a solid foundation for succeeding campaigns. The entire community is indebted to these citizens for their unselfish and devoted service in this campaign."

"Be It Further Resolved, that the names of all such participants be entered upon the official records of the Community Chest as constituting an "Honor Roll" in connection with the first annual campaign." "The splendid cooperation and generous response of Highland Park citizens generally in this important city-wide civic enterprise has been most gratifying to the officers of the Community Chest." Alfred T. Sihler, president, said. "The fine spirit manifested by the community as a whole toward this first "Chest" campaign augurs well for the future and indicates that in the "Chest" movement the community has found a medium for united civic endeavor in which all can take an active part and share in the pride of community accomplishment."

Woman's Club Active in Christmas Work

Scraps of materials of all sorts are needed by the Social Service department of the Highland Park Woman's club for their work in making clothes for the dolls which are being repaired by the Highland Park Fire department. At the next meeting the committee requests that members bring the toys, canned foods and clothing which they have been collecting for the Crippled Children's clinic party in Waukegan. There will be at least 35 children to be provided for there as well as the older boys at the Dorcas Home. Extra contributions will be used in Highland Park or at the Lake Bluff Orphanage. Mrs. Clara B. Anderson will organize a committee to wrap the gifts.

In order that there will be no duplication, headquarters will act as a clearing house for any wishing

to give Christmas baskets. Those who do not have a family in mind may bring any contributions to the Woman's club. The committee will pack and deliver the baskets. As there will be at least 100 families to provide for who may not be taken care of by other Highland Park agencies, residents are asked to make any contributions possible, or to ask Mrs. George Fawell or Mrs. Melville S. Flinn for the name of a family needing such help.

Harriet Nelson Pledged By Mortar Board At University of Chicago

Miss Harriet Nelson, 640 Skokie avenue, Highland Park, is one of the women who were pledged by Mortar Board in the recently concluded rushing period for girls' clubs at the University of Chicago. The thirteen clubs pledged 129

in all, the largest group since 1932. In that year by a change in the rules rushing was deferred to the winter quarter. This fall brought a return to the previous system, under which pledging is done in the autumn quarter. Mortar Board accepted fourteen pledges, including Miss Nelson. The girls' clubs are practically as influential in undergraduate activities at Chicago as sororities are at other schools.

Hoermann Paintings on Exhibit Here

One of the most beautiful exhibits ever held at the H.P.W.C. is the current showing from the collection of canvasses by Carl Hoermann. This exhibit comes directly from a recent show at the Chicago Galleries. Mr. Hoermann's paintings have

been viewed with great enthusiasm and favorable comment by those attending the many lectures, meetings and entertainments given at the Woman's club during the past month.

Carl Hoermann, a former resident of Highland Park, and a brother of William Hoermann, architect, is now a permanent member of the Saugatuck, Michigan, Art Colony. Although he is an etcher, wood-carver, and architect, Mr. Hoermann is now devoting all his time to painting. He has specialized in the ever-interesting Michigan Dunes at Sunset and the landscapes of Arizona.

In the Santa Fe Railroad company collection, Carl Hoermann is represented by four large canvasses of the Grand Canyon, a subject painted in all its grandeur and splendor of color. The subject justly won for him his first recognition. Schools of Chicago, LaGrange,

Milwaukee, and Detroit as well as several leading Women's clubs have included Hoermann's canvasses in their permanent collections.

As the protegee of Prince Carl Maria Fugger, Augsburg, Carl Hoermann was a student of the Royal Art Academy in Munich. He has been awarded the Englewood Woman's Club prize, the Chicago Art Institute, 1927, and also the Logan Purchase prize. The Illinois Academy of Fine Arts, 1928.
