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not be included in the \$200,000,000 Public Works Administration grant program which was announced in September. This action does not imply that the project is not desirable and sound, or that it has been rejected.

"We have received applications for eligible projects involving grants of more than \$700,000,000. Only \$200,000,000 was available for allocation. In selecting projects for the program, therefore, the Administration realized that many worthy projects could not be included because of limited funds.

"We are deferring action on the applications not included in the approved list so that they may be given consideration should additional funds become available.

See Possibility of Reopening Ravinia

The famous Ravinia opera, founded and sponsored by Samuel Eckstein who died last Thursday in his apartment at the Drake hotel, Chicago, may be reopened next summer through the cooperation of his widow, Mrs. Elsie Snyder Eckstein.

Although Eckstein's will contained no provisions for the care and upkeep of the project, which was discontinued in 1931 after heavy losses, Mrs. Eckstein said: "He knew I have as much sympathy for the opera as he had. He knew, too, that should the need for a creative leader for the opera arise, I would lend by cooperation. The park, of course, is always there. Mr. Eckstein owned the land."

Other civic leaders are in favor of the project, Mrs. Eckstein revealed, and it is possible that with their help Eckstein's plan to open next summer with the Chicago Symphony orchestra accompanying the opera might be carried out.
