Christmas Gifts for Children
Christmas is coming—Christmas with its home atmosphere of love, of wonder and beauty—the sparkling candlelit tree—pine scented air full of mystery and expectancy—the story of Bethlehem and the Shepherds—the sound of deer, familiar carols—Santa Claus and his swift-footed reindeers—and, the bulging stockings on Christmas morning. What a fairy feeling there is in a child's stocking and the surroundings. There are gifts and gifts—things to eat—things to use—and last but not least—things to read—books of enchantment, of revelation and beauty, and what is more welcome than these gifts?

There is a rich, colorful field to choose from old favorites, and new ones which are rapidly becoming favorites.

New Books for Younger Children
"Children of the Northlights" by Ingrid and Edgar Parin D'Aulaire—\$2.00. A story of two little Lapp children in the far north, where reality mingles with fantasy, where the beautiful northlight flames across a dark star-lettered sky and where the reindeers dart over the hard-frozen ground—an outstanding book full of color, of joy and charm.

"Johnny Crow's New Garden" by Leslie Brooke—\$1.50. A new story about an old story—

"Johnny Crow," whom perhaps you know has enlarged his garden.
"Up in the Air," by Marjorie Flack—\$1.75. A perfect little story of the cock, the sheep and the duck who had the honor of being the first creatures living on the earth to ascend the air.

"The Little Book About God," by Lauren Ford—\$1.50. Thumbnail sketches of exquisite beauty, reminiscent of the naive charm of an illuminated manuscript of the middle ages. A text as simple, as open and full of love as the heart of a little child. The ideal Christmas gift for any small child.

"Young Cowboy," by Will James—\$1.50. A cowboy story for children under ten, a book full of color and exciting adventures.

"Little Baby Ann," by Lois Lenski—75c. A picture book for the tiny child, simple and decorative, a story of a baby's day.

"Honk, the Moose," by Phil Stong—\$2.00. One of the clearest and

most delightful books of the year. A story of two small boys from a friendly little Minnesota town and a moose—quite a human moose, too. The illustrations by Kurt Wiese, colorful and expressive, are as much a part of the book as the text itself.

"Steamboat Billy," by Sanford Tousey—\$1.50. A simple but picturesque account of a little boy's journey on the Ohio river. Incidentally, he also learns about steamboats and the history of steamboating.

Poetry

"Sung Under the Silver Umbrella" by Association for Childhood Education—\$2.00. An anthology of poetry for younger children, a diversified collection prepared by people who know and work with children.

"Rainbow in the Sky," by Louis Untermeyer—\$3.00. Over five hundred poems for young children are included, well-known, classical ones as well as less familiar ones, a little bit of everything.

Older Children

"Caddie Woodlawn," by Carol R. Brink—\$2.00. A book of action and strength. The story of a tomboy of a girl, who grew up in the early pioneer days of Wisconsin in the picturesque days of the settling of the Middle-West.

"The Golden Horseshoe," by Elizabeth Coatsworth—\$2.00. On a background of colonial Virginia is presented a lovely little picture of Tamar, the child of an Indian princess and a southern colonel and of her half brother, Roger.

"Young Walter Scott," by Elizabeth Janet Gray—\$2.00. A wonderfully simple story of Sir Walter as a boy, natural and alive, perseverant and plucky, with a passionate love for the old ballads and history of Scotland.

"Three Sides of Agiohook," by Eric P. Kelly—\$2.00. A tale of Connecticut Valley, a remarkable picture of Indian life and the founding and early days of Dartmouth College based on authentic records and told with enthusiasm.

"Patsy's Progress," by Rose Knox—\$2.00. A young southern girl's natural development in her home, in her school and through her social life, in the 1890's and early 1900's.

"The Coot Club," by Arthur Ransome—\$2.00. Another story about Dick and Dorothea of "Winter Holiday," delightfully told, with new adventures and thrilling experiences at sea and shore.

"The Good Master," by Kate Seredy—\$2.00. The great plains of Hungary, folklore and customs, woven into a glorious story of everyday life of the boy, Janesi and his cousin, Kate, under the warm and understanding influence of the boy's father, the good master. Outstanding illustrations by the author.

"Canoeing With the Cree," by Arnold Severeid—\$1.75. A clear, straightforward account of a true, thrilling adventure. The journey of two high school graduates from Minneapolis to Hudson Bay, two thousand two hundred and fifty miles in an 18 foot canoe.

"All Sail Set," by A. Sperry—\$2.00. A real story of the sea from the time of the clipper ships. The "Flying Clouds" exciting trip around the Horn.

"Boy on Horseback," by Lincoln Steffens—\$2.00. The first part of Lincoln Steffens' autobiography dealing with his boyhood in the West in the 1870's, his interest in horses, in the country, around, and in people. A future classic.

"Red Salute" with Barbara Stanwyck and Robert Young, Dec. 15, 16, Sunday, Monday. Difference of opinion is in evidence regarding this film. "Red Salute" treats a serious theme, the red agitator on the campus, too flippantly. The motherless daughter of a general of the United States Army becomes infatuated with a "Red" and is finally saved from her radicalism by "Uncle Sam" an American soldier. Adults.

"Charlie Chan in Shanghai" with Warner Oland and Irene Hervey, Dec. 17, 18, "Tuesday and Wednesday. This mystery drama presents Warner Oland in another of the exciting Charlie Chan episodes. Chan goes to Shanghai to end the opium traffic. He is ably assisted by his American-educated son. Well directed and acted. Family.

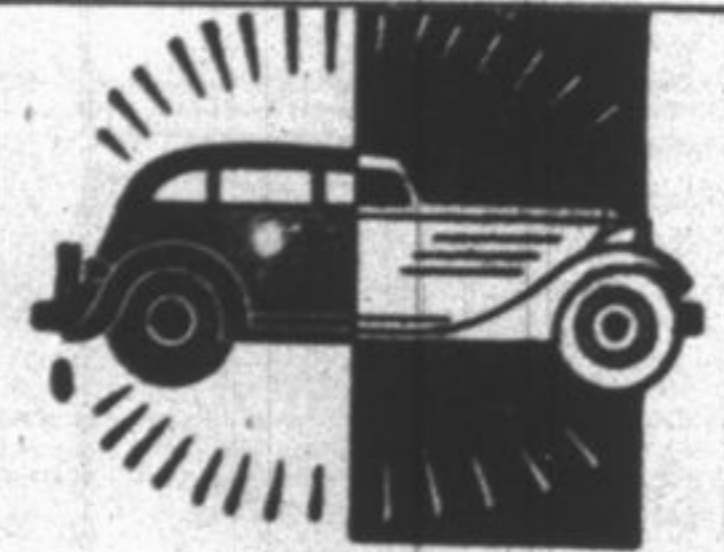
