

CHRISTMAS SEALS

A survey of the seal sale today revealed that of the 13,000 letters sent out by the Lake County Tuberculosis association only a little more than 4600 have been heard from as yet.

In order to save the association considerable expense in sending out follow-up cards and letters to those who have not sent in their contributions, it is urged that the Christmas Seals be used generously at this time when wrapping packages and mailing greeting cards and letters, and that donations to help the tuberculosis work in Lake County be sent in as soon as possible.

The seal sale today stands at \$6,219.93, which is about one hundred dollars behind that of last year at this same time. However, officials believe that when all the people send in their contributions for the seals, an increase over last year's total will be shown.

It is imperative that the returns be greater than those of last year if the chest clinics are to be increased from one to two a month in the coming years. The association feels this is very important if it is to care for the many persons desiring a free chest examination at its clinics.

Christmas seals alone finance all phases of the work done by the Lake County Tuberculosis association.


