

PLANS PROGRESS FOR N. S. ICE CARNIVAL

ments have been completed for handling the crowd at Sunset park on the afternoon of the event, all is in readiness for the staging of the ice meet. A cordon of police under the direct supervision of Chief Edward Moroney, co-operating with a large force of civilians and members of the American Legion under the direction of Col. J. B. Jackson will be on hand to see that all goes smoothly during the progress of the show.

In addition to the school and novelty events, spectators will see one of the finest exhibitions of individual and group fancy skating ever staged in this section of the country when members of the Chicago Figure Skating club take the ice to present their speciality at the carnival. One of the leading organizations of its kind in the country, the club is composed of a group of figure skating enthusiasts residing in Chicago and the suburban area. They are all members of the United States Figure Skating association, a branch of the Amateur Skating union, which supervises all big ice events staged in the United States.

For their appearance here, the Chicago club members have been perfecting solo and group numbers which include some of the most unusual and intricate skating in their routine. Spins and spirals, waltzes and ten-steps, lifts and glides—all executed in perfect unison by pairs and mixed groups will both thrill and delight the audience. Performed with a grace and rhythm of movement that is characteristic of figure skating, the exhibition is sure to appeal to spectators.

Featured performers with the Chicago Figure Skating club are the two north shore girls who will headline the program at the ice carnival. Miss Eleanor Berger of Kenilworth and 11 year old Nancy Meyer of Highland Park are considered two of the best amateur figure skaters in their respective classes in the middle west. Miss Berger is the club champion, while little Miss Meyer—the youngest member of the club—has already gained wide prominence in the juvenile division. Both will give solo exhibitions at the Highland Park event.

Since the club was organized in 1920, its members have played prominent roles in the history and development of figure skating in America. During this period its roster has included the names of many persons prominent in the business and social life of Chicago and suburbs. Many of the former club champions have gone on to national and international skating fame.

The entire program arranged for the ice carnival is designed to make the event pleasing from the spectator's point of view. The ace performers participating lend assurance that the exhibition numbers will equal any which have ever appeared at ice shows in the Chicago area. In addition, the speed and novelty events will furnish an opportunity for many to compete for the first time in a recognized ice meet.

Friendship club girls took off a bus tour along Maxwell street, through the stockyards, a broadcasting station, and Chinatown with Alice Karvinen as a convincing Mrs. Hutton, tour leader. Losing some of the party in Chinatown and box lunches were cleverly brought into the skit written by Dorothy Clauson, a member of this club of household employees. BONUS WOULD BRING \$1,935,335 TO LAKE CO.

Big Boost To Business Foreseen If Bonus Is Passed Immediately

When and if the adjusted service compensation certificates (the soldiers' bonus) are paid in full, Lake County will benefit to the extent of \$1,935,335, according to figures compiled and printed in the January 1936 issues of the Lake County Legionnaire.

Quoting from the Legion paper, "One point in the payment of the certificates that has been kept in the background, and is one of the main reasons why the payment is opposed by politicians, is that the money will go directly to the recipient. In other words there will be no jobs or "gravy" for the political machine, as is found in other public expenditures. Payment will also in a large measure cut down the clerical force needed to take care of the necessary bookkeeping in connection with the present status of the certificates, and thus eliminate more political jobs.

"Figures for each state were estimated by Representative Wright Patman of Texas, and then compiled for each county in each state by the Legion state department. The Adjusted Service Certificate money would be distributed to Lake County approximately as follows:

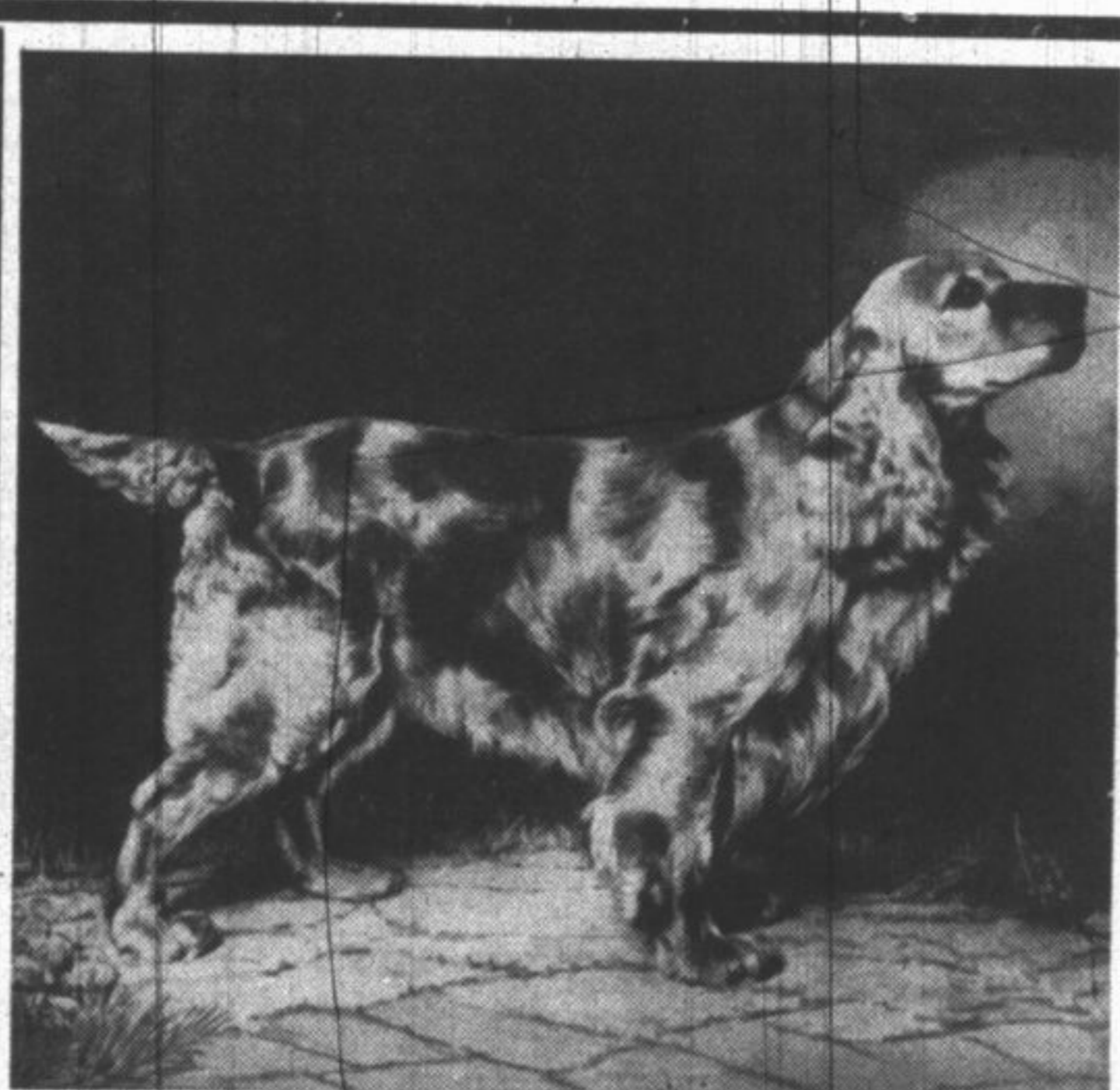
"The round numbers are based on the known number of veterans residing in these 22 towns receiving an average check of \$500 each."

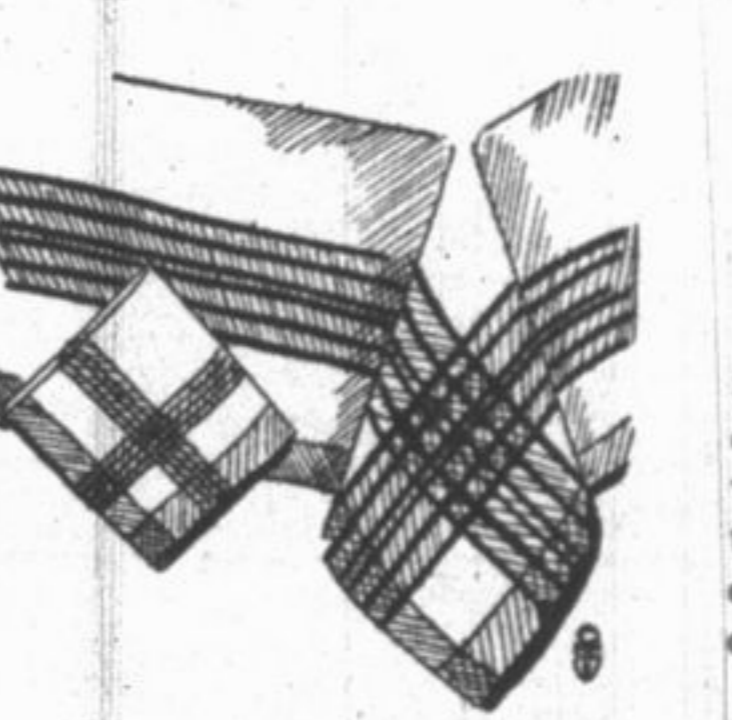

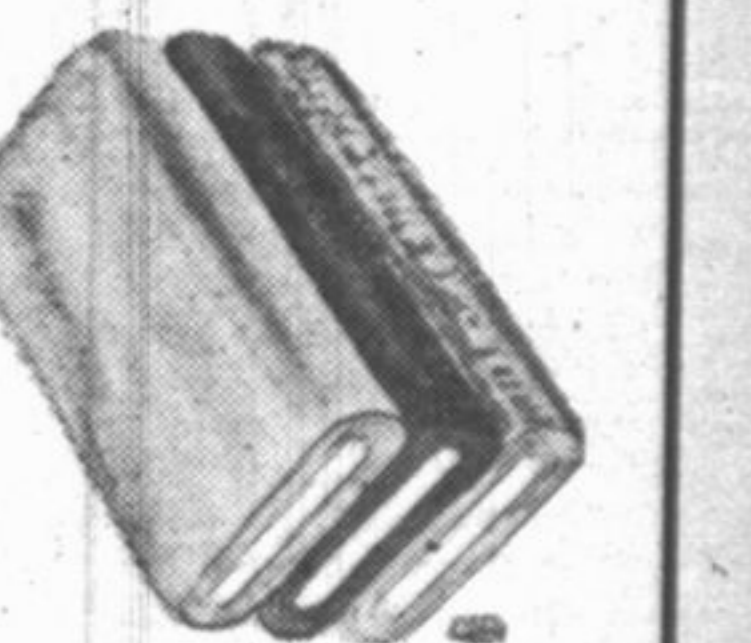
