Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Thom of Hickory street have left for Los Angeles California to spend the winter with their daughter Mrs. J. H. Brown.

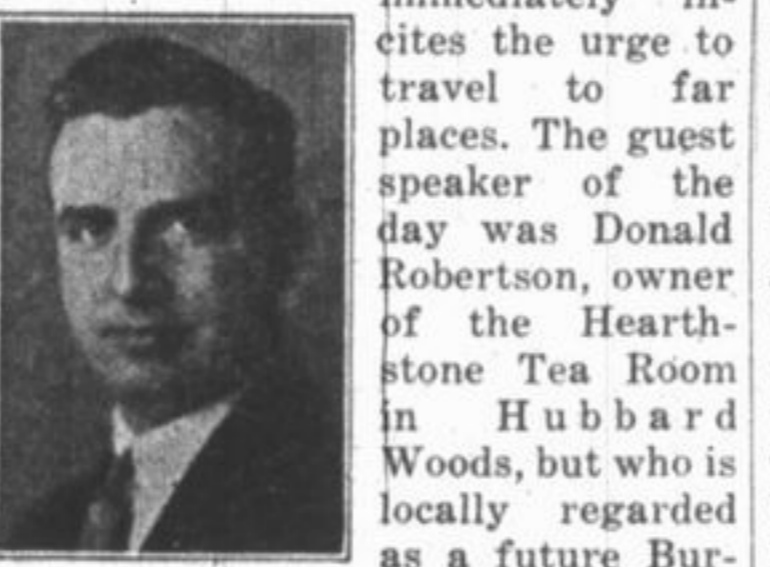
Mrs. Veverly Parson and daughter Joan of Oakland drive flew to Florida and are staying at the Roney Plaza hotel in Miami.
