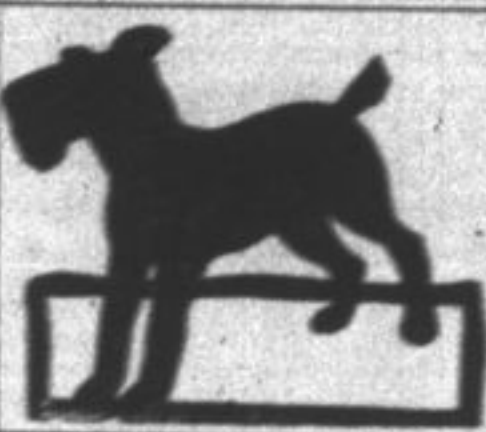


DOGS AND CHILDREN

If we face the facts impartially and honestly, we shall have to admit that the average child under five years of age, and oftentimes a good many older ones, are extremely rough, although sometimes it is unconsciously so, in the way in which they handle a dog, especially a young puppy. Puppies' tails, legs, and ears are fascinating handholds to which a child's attention is immediately drawn, and which are just as sensitive to pain as that sensitiveness is unappreciated by playful youngsters.

Children who are not wholly and fully qualified by age, temperament and preliminary training should not be allowed to have a young puppy, regardless of the sentimentality of the subject. It is inhumane, to say the least, to subject a defenseless pup to the mauling which not infrequently results in permanent physical damage. A more mature dog is able to make his escape from rough handling at the hands of a child, or at least is better able to endure it than the younger dog. As for the more mature dog being unpleasantly rough himself, that difficulty need not be considered if the choice of the breed and the individual has been wise in the first place, for most mature dogs have an instinctive fondness of children that is hard to duplicate, unless they have learned the opposite through the process of bitter experience, and they seem to have a realization of the fact that the smaller the child the more necessary is gentleness and protection.

In all fairness to the canine members of the family, in starting to provide children with the kind of a dog playmate that one likes to see, their personal contacts should be carefully supervised, in order to assure a square deal all around. It is

a great mistake to allow youngsters to pull and haul a defenseless dog as they please. He may emerge from the experience with a disposition that is all that it should be, or on the other hand, he may not. However, if reasonable humane treatment, as well as canine forbearance is upheld, and provided that the dog is a normal member of the species, the chances are that the results will be all that are desirable. It is very necessary that the dog be allowed to learn that both sides will be given an even break.

When once a mutual understanding has been established, it will be hard to find a better friend and body guard for the young master and mistress, for dogs have a peculiar way of attaching themselves to children and taking a great deal of responsibility as to their welfare. Of course, there are professional trainers who make a business of teaching their charges to guard and protect certain individuals and objects, but it is far better for this instinct towards children to be developed in the course of time, in a natural manner.
