HOUSEHOLD HINTS

There are all sorts of tricks you can try with hard sauce. Make it, for instance, with brown or maple sugar instead of white. Cut up dates or nuts very fine and add. Color with fruit coloring to harmonize with the pudding or the rest of your dinner.

Use grated egg as a garnish for mixed green salad. Grate the whites first, then dust the yolks over the top.

When radishes are used in salads they should be sliced almost as thin as paper.

For fingers stained from fixing raw vegetables a solution of exceedingly strong tea should be made. Dip your fingers into this for a short while and then wash with soap and water.

After a room has been painted an excellent way to remove the smell of the paint is to place a pail of water to which has been added a few slices of raw onion in the room and leave it there over night. Keep the doors and windows closed, and the smell will be entirely gone by morning.

Rubbing the hands with dry salt will remove all odor left from peeling and slicing onions.

If you're going to beat the egg whites and yolks separately it's wise to remember that yolks separate most easily when the eggs are chilled, but that you can get greater volume and fluffier souffles when you let your egg whites warm up to room temperature before beating them stiff.
