

### DEERFIELD CHURCH CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

#### Organized 60 Years Ago, St. Paul's Church Holds Celebration

St. Paul's Evangelical Church of Deerfield will celebrate its sixtieth anniversary with three services on Sunday, Feb. 9, and departmental celebrations throughout the week. This jubilee not only honors the sixtieth birthday of the church but is also in celebration of the completion of the remodeling of the church edifice.

Following is a brief outline of Sunday's program:

10:30 a.m. worship service. Dr. A. Kienit, superintendent of Deaconess hospital preaching; St. Paul's Presentation of history by pastor, Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok. Reception of new members.

4:00 p.m. — Choir of St. John's Evangelical Church, Evanston, in musical program. Dr. W. F. Weir of Deerfield Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Earl J. Brusio, of Bethlehem Church of Deerfield, will give brief messages.

5:00 p.m. — Luncheon in church basement served by ladies of St. Paul's Church. Public is cordially invited. No charge. Free will offering.

7:30 p.m. — Worship service, Rev. Armin Bizer of St. Peter's Church, of Northbrook, preaching. Quartet from Irving Park Baptist Church, guest artists. Pastors of Arlington Heights Pastoral Conference participating in order of worship.

**Brief History of the Church**  
St. Paul's Evangelical Church was called into existence in 1875, when 23 families organized the church.

The land was donated by one of the charter members, William Osterman, and the church was completed for dedication in November 1875.

The parsonage, just north of the church, at the corner of Waukegan Road and Osterman Avenue, was built in 1893.

The pipe organ was acquired during Rev. Bosold's pastorate, and at that time gas lights replaced the oil lamps and new floors were built.

During Rev. Holdgraf's administration the building underwent further improvement. Electricity replaced gas lights and stained glass memorial windows contributed by members of the congregation for their dead parents transformed the auditorium of the church.

In 1935, during Rev. Piepenbrok's pastorate the church has received its greatest remodeling. The structure was raised, a new foundation put in, and a modern dining room, kitchen, toilets, and recreation facilities occupy the fine new basement. A new entrance to the church is a memorial to the late William Ott.

At the fiftieth anniversary celebration there were but 75 members. Since 1925 there have been received by confirmation 114; by confession of faith and by letter 120. Present membership numbers 268. More baptisms have been performed by the Rev. Piepenbrok in the past ten years than in all the previous fifty years.

Rev. Piepenbrok is an active minister in an active church. His very efficient wife has done much in making his Deerfield pastorate a success.

Two sons, Helmuth, a sophomore at the University of North Carolina, and Frederick Jr., who attends Deerfield-Shields high school, complete their family circle.
