**George Rockenbach Turns 95th Milestone**

Mr. George Rockenbach celebrated his 95th birthday anniversary on Sunday, February 2, at his home in Deerfield. His daughters, Misses Viola and Irene, assisted him in receiving the guests who came that day to offer felicitations. Mr. Rockenbach is in excellent health and many of his guests remarked that he seemed younger that day than he had on his ninetieth anniversary, and they are looking forward to a big celebration in 1941 at his centennial.

On Saturday evening, Mr. Rockenbach acted as host at dinner to twenty-two of his twenty-four great-grandchildren and their parents. Messages of congratulations have been coming to him this past week from friends and relatives unable to attend. From France came the message traveling the longest distance, others came from Florida, Texas, California and many other states.

**Illinois Buys \$14,000 Worth of "Baby Bonds"**

Illinois citizens, in the eight months ending January 1, 1936, bought \$14,637,868 worth of United States Savings Bonds, from March 1, 1935 to December 31, 1935, \$202,500,000 worth of the bonds were sold throughout the United States by the Postal department and the Treasury.

When these bonds mature in 10 years they will pay face value or \$270,000,000, representing an interest on the money invested, of about 2.9%. The bonds are sold at an issue price less than face value so that when the bonds are redeemed in ten years they will have increased in value by exactly one-third of the purchase price.

Popularly known as 'Baby Bonds' these bonds sell in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1000, were

placed on the market by the government to give the people an opportunity to invest their funds in government obligations that would return not just the annual interest, but the invested amount plus the compounded interest. They are intended for the small investor and to stimulate a greater interest among the people as a whole in government financing, debt, taxes and expenditures.

The bonds are exempt from all Federal and local taxation, excepting succession taxes, such as taxes on inheritances, gifts, and the like.

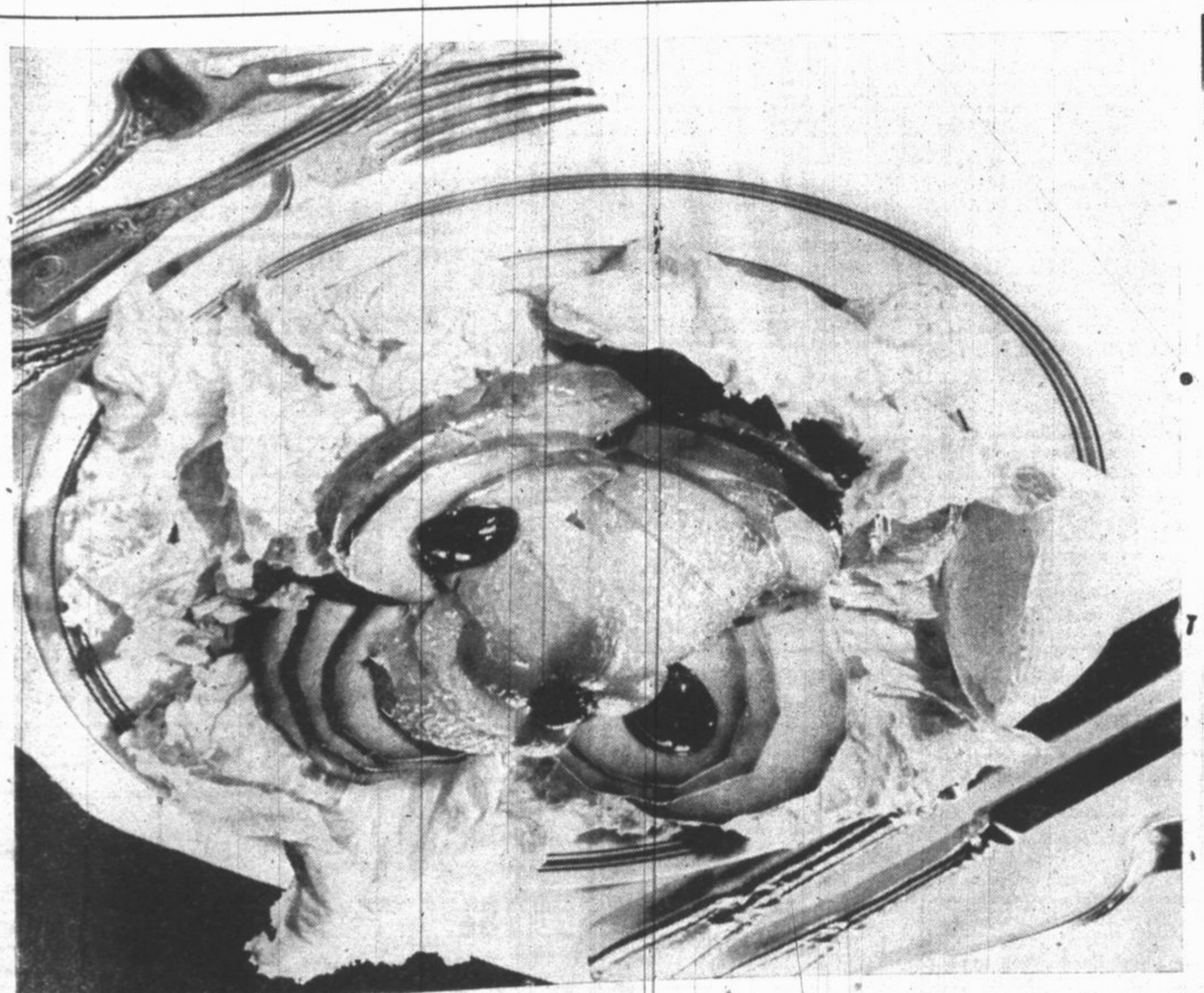
