This Week in Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 1 — As the political party conventions and the elections approach the halls of Congress are used more and more as the sounding board for expression

of the political views of the members of the two major parties. It has been particularly characteristic of the past week that more time has been consumed by the Congress in discussing political issues than in actual debate on the bills pending.

Time and again a member of Congress would ask unanimous consent to address the House for 10 or 15 minutes. It could be anticipated that the speech would not pertain to the immediate business before the House but rather it would repre-

sent a criticism of the other political party and praises for the accomplishments of his own party.

The major topic for discussion has not been the pending departmental appropriation bill. Rather it has been the speech of Governor Alfred E. Smith and the refusal of the United States Marine Band to keep its engagement to play last Wednesday evening at the banquet of the Women's Patriotic Conference on National Defense. The "walk out"

of the Marine Band followed the cancellation of scheduled speeches at the business sessions of the conference by three high-ranking officers of the United States Navy. It was all precipitated by the speech which former Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby delivered at the conference meeting the night before, making an attack on the New Deal.

Last Wednesday Representative George P. Darrow, Republican, of Pennsylvania, ranking minority member of the Naval Affairs committee, introduced a resolution into the House calling upon the Secretary of Navy for information as to whose order or command caused the United States Marine Band to cancel its engagement. And so the debate ensues as to whether the Marine Band belongs to the people of the United States or to the party in power. Heated arguments take place as to whether the band should play at a conference where someone criticized the Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy (President Roosevelt), for which criticism the patriotic ladies of the conference disclaim any responsibility.

One could well understand why Representative John M. Houston, Democrat, of Kansas, prefaced his recent remarks on the floor of the House by saying, "In an effort to calm the troubled waters that have upset the Congress for the last three days and to smooth the ruffled feelings of my friend, the gentleman from Pennsylvania, I am going to change the subject of discussion. And, strange as it may seem, I am not going to talk on the walk-out of Al Smith, or the speech of Senator Borah, or the speech of Governor Talmadge, or the expected speech of Governor Landon."

Representative Houston kept his word. He delivered a speech on the greatness of the State of Kansas. And, believe it or not, the actual business before the House was the Interior Department Appropriation Bill.

Representative Wesley E. Disney, Democrat, of Oklahoma, believes that there is a serious need for Government trained men to fill the various administrative positions of the

Federal Service. He has introduced a bill for the establishment of a National Academy of Public Affairs. The Academy is to be along the same lines as West Point and Annapolis, where young men are trained to enter into the military and

naval services. In support of his proposal Representative Disney calls attention to the fact that the administration of the British Government is in the hands of a select group of specialists educated for the patriotic work of the civil service.

Housing and Accommodations for Dogs

Those people fortunate enough to be the possessors of a yard or garden and an extremely large dog, will be doing the right thing if they set aside a portion of that yard for the housing as well as for some of the exercise of the dog. The exercise should not be combined wholly to this space, which after all will not be of too great an extent, but at least it is very convenient. It is a well known fact that several of the larger known breeds of dogs thrive and are healthier if kept out in the open, providing that common sense is used with regard to inclement weather conditions.

The sort of accommodation provided depends a great deal upon the means and whims of the owner. There are companies which specialize in the building of substantial outdoor dog-kennels and runs, and if the finances are available, it might be best to purchase something of this sort and avoid the heart-breaks of trying to erect one oneself, if one has had no experience along this line previously.

The site of the kennel, particularly, and the run is of prime importance. It should be sheltered as much as possible from the weather and be on high, dry ground, away from any kind of moisture such as drains and ditches. Drainage should be provided, and the whole area should be maintained in a dry state as much as is possible. If the area is of cement, it must be remembered that this material is both cold and hard, and something must be provided that

is warmer and softer upon which the dog may lie when he is not exercising. Cement flooring is very good in that it may be washed thoroughly and kept clean with a minimum of trouble and effort. Incidentally, when benches and kennels are washed and scrubbed they must be dried absolutely before the dog is allowed to return to them. This cannot be stressed too much.

The kennel should be damp and weather proof, and ventilated at the eaves. In addition, if it is not large enough for a person to enter it, the roof should be removable in order that a systematic, thorough cleaning may take place. Actual "wet" washing of the woodwork of the kennel should not be attempted too often due to the difficulty encountered in drying it. However, it may be periodically wiped over with a soapy sponge in which has been incorporated a little soda, wiped dry, and then sponged over again with a reliable disinfectant.

The height of the run walls will vary depending upon the breed of dog and his ability to jump and climb. Runs six feet high with an eighteen inch "heel in" at the top, and the wire bedded six or eight inches in the ground to prevent digging under ought to serve very well for all but the most unusual cases. Care must be used in the selection of wire for a run in order to avoid possible injury to the dog.
