COL. A. V. SMITH DIES SATURDAY

Services Held Tuesday For Former Lake County State's Attorney

Col. A. V. Smith, state's attorney in Lake county from 1921 to 1933, died suddenly at 11 p.m. Saturday night at Victory Memorial hospital from a heart attack.

Veterans of the World War, the Villa expedition to Mexico, Spanish-American war and foreign wars were in charge of the military funeral held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the Christ Episcopal church.

The Lake County Bar association, of which Col. Smith was president in 1933, attended the funeral services in a body.

Name Pallbearers: Pallbearers were past commanders of the Homer Dahlinger Post of the American Legion, all in uniform.

Honorary pallbearers were Judge Ralph J. Dady, Clarence W. Diver, W. L. Blows, Benjamin Parmalee, Minard E. Hulse, Walter McShane, Fred Hoff, Bryan Husted and William Miller.

Colorbearers were John J. McDonald and Joseph Gilmore. The American Legion quartet, headed by Commander Warren G. Siver, sang at the services.

On returning from Villa expedition in 1916, Col. Smith entered politics in Lake county. He was a candidate for state's attorney against the late James G. Welch on the Republican party ticket.

Ravinia Players Will Present New Type of Production Feb. 21

Breaking off completely from the type of play which they have presented in the past, the Ravinia Players will give their first costume play next week, when they give their charity benefit performance of Benn W. Levy's fantasy, "Mrs. Moonlight," at the Ravinia Village House, on February 21.

Until now, all of the productions of the group have been plays of the present, but in this one they not only will go to the past, but each of the three acts takes place in a different period.

The play is the story of a woman who is very much in love with her husband, and who is afraid that when she grows old she will be less beautiful, and will lose his love. She has in her possession, as a gift from her Scotch nurse, an old ring which is supposed to bear a charm, and to grant one wish to every owner, regardless of what that wish may be.

Her wish is granted, and the play deals with the experiences of this woman who never grows old, over a period of fifty years, the first act taking place early in the eighteenth century, the second about the turn of the present time.

In the coming production, the title role will be portrayed by Gertrude Williams Butler with J. Lincoln Gibson, playing opposite. The former, who was one of the founders of the Players, and who has done much work both in radio and on the professional stage, is well known to

local audiences for her work with the group in past seasons. However, this will be her first appearance in a major role in almost three years, her only other appearance since the spring of 1933 having been in a one-act play last spring.

Mr. Gibson is playing his first role with the Players, in the capacity of a guest star. He is, however, no stranger to Highland Park audiences, having appeared here in past seasons with both the North Shore Theatre guild, and the North Shore Circuit theatre.

The role of Edith, Sarah Moonlight's sister, will be played by Katherine Kirschberg, who has played in the past with both the Threshold Players, in Glencoe, and the Loyola Community theatre, in Rogers Park.

Enid Phillips, star of many Players productions during the past five years, will be Minnie, the old Scotch nurse, who gave the ring to Sarah, and Lee Blaylock, star juvenile of the Wilmette Players, will be Peter Moonlight, Jane's son.
