**Schooling Offered Children of Veterans**

In order to aid children, entitled to compensation as dependents on account of the death of a veteran, to continue their schooling after reaching the age prescribed by the various acts applying to dependents, the following information is furnished by the Veterans' Administration at Hines, Illinois:

Effective May 29, 1928, legislation was enacted which provided that the child of a World War Veteran who died as a result of service connected disabilities is entitled to the continuation of the death compensation subsequent to his eighteenth birthday, provided he is unmarried and is attending a school which is approved by the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs. It is necessary, in order to meet the requirements of this law, that the child be in school attendance at least three daily sessions per week. No compensation may be paid, however subsequent to the child's 21st birthday.

This eligibility to compensation was continued under the provisions of Public No. 2, 73rd Congress, commonly known as the Economy Act, which became effective on July 1, 1933; and was further liberalized by Public No. 484, 73rd Congress, which provided that the children of certain veterans who died not as a result of service connected disabilities, but who were in receipt of compensation because of a service connected disability disably to a degree of thirty per cent or more at the time of death, are also entitled to these benefits.

Public No. 2, 73rd Congress, also provided that the children of those veterans who are receiving benefits under the provisions of this Act, and for whom there is an apportioned award of the veterans' compensation because of separation, shall continue to receive the apportioned share of the veteran's compensation if they are unmarried and attending school.

In the cases of children of deceased veterans, notice is received from the office of the Director, Widows' and Dependents' Claims Service, Veterans' Administration, Washington, D. C., prior to the child's eighteenth birthday that he is entitled to these benefits. This office immediately contacts the guardian of the child, advising of his rights to continued compensation, and sends forms for his execution; whereupon he requests approval of the school which the child desires to attend subsequent to his eighteenth birthday, with the approximate dates of commencement and termination of the course. Upon receipt of these forms the school is contacted for a verification of dates, and information concerning the number of days or evenings per week the child is in actual school attendance. This information is forwarded to Central Office, with the recommendation that the course be approved or disapproved, as the case may be.

In those cases in which the child does not desire to avail himself of the benefits to which he is entitled, the office of the Director, Widows' and Dependents' Claim Service is so notified, and the case is closed pending such time as the guardian may desire to reopen it. The child may re-enter school at any time, but will receive compensation to cover only that period of time in

which he is in actual school attendance prior to his 21st birthday.

Since the original passage of this legislation the office at Hines, Illinois, which has jurisdiction over the state of Illinois, and Lake, Porter and LaPorte counties of the state of Indiana, has handled the cases of 857 children, of whom 276 previously attended school, with 154 now in attendance. There are at this time sixty cases pending information as to whether the child wishes to attend school.
